State funds are allocated each year for the Florida Alliance of Boys & Girls Clubs to provide the following through the Florida Department of Juvenile Justice:

- ? Gang Prevention Through Targeted Outreach (GPTTO): Serves youth at risk of gang involvement. A risk assessment is completed that creates an individualized plan with emphasis on gang resistance, goal setting, effective communication, problem solving, and decision making. Staff work with parents, schools, and stakeholders to ensure the success of the individualized plan that is created. Targeted primarily for youth ages 10? 14.
- ? Skills Mastery & Resistance Training (SMART Programs): Evidenced based curriculum is focused on positive peer interaction, resiliency, problem solving, decision making, and gang awareness for youth ages 6 ? 18 with particular emphasis on youth ages 6 ? 11.
- ? Training Resilient Adolescents & Youth in Leadership Skills (TRAYLS): Emphasis on providing intensive experiences for youth whose parent(s) have been deployed for active military duty. Concentration on resiliency and assisting the family with post deployment transition.

The Florida Alliance of Boys and Girls Clubs delivers services as noted above through 33 Boys & Girls Club organizations in 230+ locations across the State of Florida. Current total youth to serve is: 9,502 With Increased Funds total youth served: 16,154

Specific program service as follows:

- ? Gang Prevention Through Targeted Outreach (GPTTO): 699 current; 1188 with increased funding
- ? Skills Mastery & Resistance Training (SMART Programs): 8,785 current; 14,935 with increased funding
- ? Training Resilient Adolescents & Youth Leadership (TRAYLS): 18 current; 31 with increased funding

Florida Boys & Girls Clubs reach thousands of at-risk youth residing in our state?s most distressed communities. Clubs deliver a proven youth development strategy, access to Club services several days a week, a safe and clean environment, life-changing programs, and the opportunity to receive mentoring

experiences and relationships with diverse, trained and caring staff and volunteers in a supervised and structured environment. The 2013 study ?The Role of Risk: Mentoring Experiences and Outcomes for Youth with Varying Risk Profiles,? examined mentoring program relationships, experiences and benefits for higher-risk youth, and among the findings determined: The strongest program benefit, and most consistent across risk groups, was a reduction in depressive symptoms a particularly noteworthy finding given that almost one in four youth reported worrisome levels of these symptoms at baseline. Findings also suggested gains in social acceptance, academic attitudes and grades. In addition to benefits in specific domains, mentored youth also experienced gains in a greater number of outcomes than youth in the comparison group. Overall, the study?s results suggest that mentoring programs can be beneficial for youth with a broad range of backgrounds and characteristics. Tailoring the training and support that is available to matches based on the specific risks youth face has the potential to produce even stronger benefits.

Based on data provided from the most recent Florida Department of Juvenile Justice/Comprehensive Accountability Report 2014 for data reported FY12/13 81% (1626) of 2005 completions had 0% recidivism upon completion of services. Based on recent external evaluation study released in 2013, it was determined that the Florida Boys & Girls Clubs programs have the following impact on the state:

Short-term taxpayer benefits of \$5,000 cost avoidance for each youth kept out of the juvenile justice system. Based on the Florida Department of Juvenile Justice/Comprehensive Accountability Report results noted above, this resulted in a net savings after investment of: \$2,630,000 for this year. With increased funding requested the savings after investment would be: \$80,770,000.
