Volunteer Florida was established in Florida Statute 14.29 by the Florida Legislature in 1994. Volunteer Florida is responsible for administering national service grants in Florida, with an aggressive focus on education. Currently Volunteer Florida administers over \$31.7 million in federal, state, and local funding to deliver high-impact service and volunteer programs in Florida.

State funding allows Volunteer Florida to distribute millions of dollars in critical funding to 33 AmeriCorps grantees, including schools and non-profits serving students across the state? funding that would not be available to Florida without Volunteer Florida?s grant-making and fiscal/programmatic oversight. For every dollar the State of Florida invests in Volunteer Florida, Volunteer Florida leverages \$31 in non-state funding.

In 2014-2015, 84.7% of Volunteer Florida?s 1,289 AmeriCorps members served in an education-focused program. These AmeriCorps members mentor and tutor students, get at-risk high school students back on track to graduate, and serve in-school, after-school, and during the summer. Following their successful year of service, AmeriCorps members are eligible for a scholarship equivalent to the Pell Grant to use at Florida colleges and universities. In 2014-2015, Volunteer Florida grantees served 49,703 students through tutoring, mentoring and educational services in 268 schools. 78% of students tutored and tested improved their academic skills.

Specific target population: The specific target population for Florida?s education-based AmeriCorps programs is students in grades K-12.

Need for funds: State funding is used directly as match money, dollar for dollar, to draw down federal funding from the Corporation for National and Community Service (federal funder) for education programs across the state. State funding allows Volunteer Florida to provide fiscal and programmatic oversight for all grantees to ensure transparency and hold grantees accountable for meeting performance measures. Additionally, state funding allows Volunteer Florida to provide training and technical assistance to statewide non-profits and agencies, training them to recruit, manage, and retain skills-based volunteers. Funding allows Volunteer Florida to fulfill its statutory role as Florida?s Commission on Community Service. As the designated Commission for Florida, Volunteer Florida enables Florida to receive hundreds of thousands of dollars in funding to administer AmeriCorps funding (F.S. 14.29).

Volunteer Florida funds were approved by the Governor in 2015-2016. Governor Scott?s 2016-2017 budget recommendations included level funding for Volunteer Florida (\$683,133).

Community Support: Volunteer Florida serves a total of over 45 grantee organizations across the state one of the largest consortiums of community organizations in the nation served by a state commission. The level of service continues to grow annually. Last year, nearly 50,000 students were served.
