#### Background

Invasive lionfish are found throughout Florida?s waters in a multitude of habitats and depths and are causing significant impacts to Florida?s marine life with predicted long term impacts to Florida?s commercial and recreational fisheries and coastal economies. Ongoing removals are being shown to reduce lionfish populations at a few heavily dived locations around the state (FL Keys and Southeast FL), however the majority of State waters are not regularly dived and under increasing threats posed by the invasion. Single and multi-day events (lionfish derbies) have been shown to reduce lionfish populations and to reduce population size structure resulting in less impact to native marine life and less reproductive output (Underwood et al 2014, Green et al in review, Akins in prep). However, these events have been sporadic in nature, do not comprise the totality of Florida?s coastal waters and are typically held only once a year. During the time between derbies, lionfish recruitment repopulates removal areas to pre-derby levels. A small amount of funding has been made available through the FWC?s Lionfish Program, however these funds are not sufficient to support derbies throughout the state on a frequency needed to reduce lionfish impacts.

### Proposal

This proposal would create a Lionfish Removal Events Program to support removal at coastal locations throughout Florida on a quarterly basis. Funds would support volunteer removal teams at a level that would facilitate large scale participation at a frequency anticipated to exceed that of recolonization impacts

(including size and numbers).

Event Organization? Derby events will follow REEF Sanctioned derby protocols currently used by more than 20 derbies throughout Florida and the invaded region. Components include mandatory captains meetings, collecting and handling training, and provisions (rules) requiring samples be made available for research, incorporating outreach and awareness components and coverage of events through media channels. Events will be organized and promoted in close consultation with county governments and the dive industry.

Locations? The LREP program would provide funding to conduct derbies in each of Florida?s 34 coastal counties. Frequency of events will be initially scheduled on a quarterly basis, (136 events annually), unless data dictate changes.

Incentive? Prize money and/or other monetary incentive will be offered to encourage participation by divers. In addition, special provisions will be developed allowing the sale of collected fish to support derby activities and develop local markets.

Promotion? The LREP schedule will be promoted through multiple channels including counties, FWC, DEMA and local and regional media.

Assessment? Data will be gathered from each team participating in the LREP program at each derby event including number of lionfish seen, number removed and locations fished. All catch will be measured to determine changes in size frequency and population structure over time.

Administration and Reporting ? derby events and reporting will be managed through REEF with annual reporting of derby results including assessments of any changes in population size and structure.

Adjoining counties in less populated areas or in those with smaller coastal presence may be joined to facilitate greater participation and funds redirected to areas in need of additional derby support.

Budget ? Prize money/incentive and promotion for each event will be supported at a level of \$5,500 per derby event. Additional support through in-kind donations or other sponsorship may increase this award amount. Administration of this program will be supported by \$200,000 to the managing organization.
