

PKP1 Relating to Public School Assessments by the PreK-12 Policy Committee

The Foundation asks that you vote <u>YES</u> on PKP1 in the PreK-12 Policy Committee on February 17th. To provide for our state's future economic growth, PKP1 raises high school graduation standards to better prepare our students for life after high school, ensuring students are prepared to compete in the global marketplace and saving them and the state money on needless postsecondary remediation.

Education Week's well-respected Quality Counts reports have consistently highlighted Florida as a leader in education. Over the past four years Florida has gone from a rank of 31st, to 14th, to 10th, and is now ranked the 8th best system in the country. Despite our overall improvement, Florida perpetually fails in the category of "college readiness" – never receiving higher than 50 out of 100 points. PKP1 addresses the college readiness problem by aligning course requirements to the expectations of life after high school.

To regain our strength in the global market, we need to ensure that all students have access to rigorous math and science courses. Surveys conducted by Harris Interactive reveal that, especially for minority children, interest in advanced math courses greatly exceeds what is available to students at schools:



National research is clear: more challenging, college and career-aligned high school classes lead to continued success:

- 68% of non-college students who took Algebra II or higher say they are prepared for the math they face at work.
- 84% of individuals with highly paid professional jobs took Algebra II or higher.

Currently, a student can meet the requirements for high school graduation and not meet the minimum college admissions requirements for **any** state university.

When we raise the bar, more students work to meet the higher standards. Since adding Algebra I and the more challenging 10th grade FCAT to graduation requirements, **more** Florida students are graduating and receiving a diploma than when algebra I was not required and the exit exam was just an 8th grade level test.

Specifically, the bill:

- Incrementally raises graduation requirements in Florida to better align with the expectations of college and the
 workforce. Starting next year, the class of 2014 will be required to take geometry to graduate. Each year
 following, students will be required to take Biology I, then Algebra II, and finally chemistry <u>or</u> physics will be
 required for students in the class of 2017.
- Increases rigor by replacing portions of the FCAT with end-of-course exams in Algebra I, geometry, and biology.
- Ensures access to college preparatory courses for all by requiring every high school to offer advanced math, science, history, and English courses using AP, IB, AICE, or dual enrollment. Districts may use Florida Virtual School to fulfill this requirement, resulting in no additional costs.
- Prepares students for their future by requiring them to take at least one course online before graduating.
