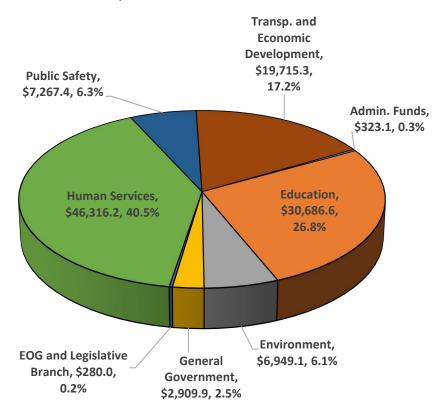

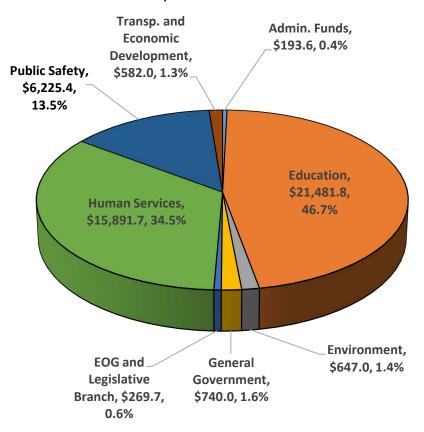

Fiscal Year 2024-25 Governor Recommended Budget

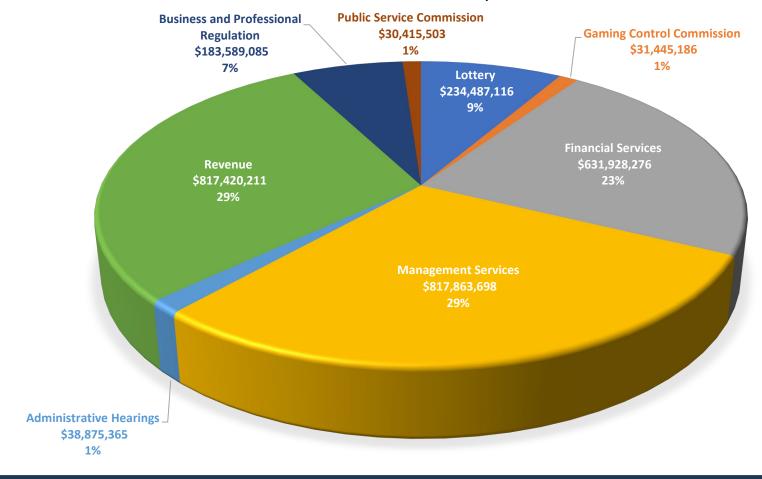
Total Budget \$114.4 Billion

What is My Safe Florida Homes?

The My Safe Florida Home Program (Program) is a wind mitigation grant Program to harden single family homes against future wind damage. Through home hardening, the Program's goal is to help homeowners obtain the lowest possible insurance premiums.

Two grant types: Matching - \$2 for every \$1, up to \$10,000

Low Income - No matching required, up to \$10,000

My Safe Florida Home (MSFH) - Budget

• The MSFH budget (since inception):

Home Inspections	Education & Consumer Awareness	Administration

Program Requirements

Statutory Wind Inspection Qualifications:

- Site-built,
- Single-family,
- · Residential home.
- Homeowner must prove homestead exemption.
- Townhomes added 7/1/23.

Statutory Grant Qualifications:

- Home must be a dwelling with an insured value of \$700,000 or less.
- The building permit application for initial construction of the home must have been made before July 1, 2008.



What does the grant pay for?

Roof related items:

- Roof deck attachments
- Roof-to-wall connections
- Secondary water barrier for roof

Opening protection improvements:

- Hurricane impact windows and doors
- Hurricane shutters for windows and doors

The Steps

The Program follows these basic steps:

- Complete an initial home inspection to determine what areas of the home could be improved.
- Following initial inspection, the homeowner applies for a mitigation grant.
- Once approved for the grant, funds are set aside for the homeowner, pending completion of the work.
- Homeowner selects a contractor, and work can begin.
- Following completion of the work, homeowner request final inspection.
- Final inspection is completed.
- Homeowner request reimbursement and submits required receipts.
- Reimbursement is processed.

My Safe Florida Home - Administration

- The Program is primarily outsourced from an administration perspective however, DFS is involved in daily operational oversight.
- The primary contractor handles:
 - √ The application portal,
 - ✓ Review and approval of request for inspections and grants,
 - ✓ Customer service calls and correspondence,
 - ✓ Communications with inspection vendors.
- Four contractors conduct home inspections state wide.
- DFS conducts:
 - √ Contract management activities,
 - ✓ Program outreach and education,
 - ✓ Payment auditing and processing, and
 - ✓ Review of requests for reconsideration.

My Safe Florida Home - Milestones

- November 18, 2022 first applications for home inspections.
- December 14, 2022 first application for a mitigation grant.
- January 4, 2023 approved the first grant.
- March 10, 2023 first final (post construction) inspection was completed.
- March 20, 2023 first reimbursement was processed.
- September 21, 2023 Grant application portal is closed.
- November 13, 2023 Governor signs HB 1C, appropriating additional grant funds of \$176 million to the program for existing grant applicants.

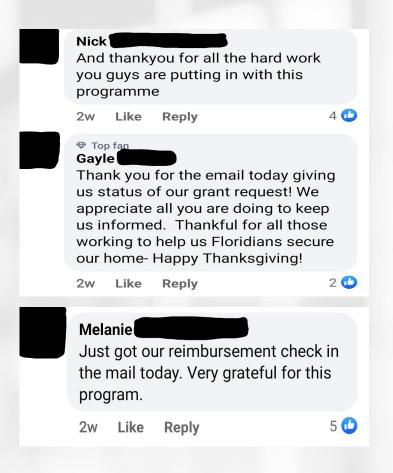

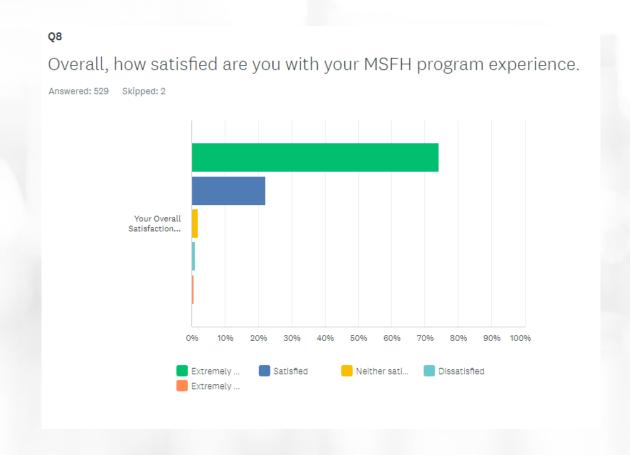
MSFH – Current Statistics

- Homeowners realizing a premium reduction: 2,050
- Homeowners who did not realize a premium reduction: 1044
- Homeowners who saw a premium increase: 625
- No premium information provided/available: 477

MSFH – The Future

The Program's 24/25 Legislative Budget Request:

- Home inspections: \$17.28 million
- Grants: \$200 million
- Administration/Outreach: \$8.5 million (Includes contractor and DFS costs with 3 FTE.)
