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Proposed Committee Substitute by the Committee on Education Pre-K - 12

An act relating to the designation of high school grades; amending s. 1008.34, F.S, relating to the school grading system; providing for a revised high school grading system beginning with the 2009-2010 school year which includes the statewide standardized assessment, graduation rates, performance and participation in certain courses, postsecondary readiness as measured by certain examinations, and the change in these factors from year to year; specifying the data components to be used in determining the revised high school grading system; requiring that the criteria for school grades give added weight to the graduation rate of all eligible at-risk students; providing an effective date.

16 Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

18 Section 1. Subsection (3) of section 1008.34, Florida 19 Statutes, is amended to read:

20 1008.34 School grading system; school report cards; district grade.--21

22 (3)DESIGNATION OF SCHOOL GRADES. -- Each school that has 23 students who are tested and included in the school grading system, except an alternative school that receives a school 24 25 improvement rating pursuant to s. 1008.341, shall receive a 26 school grade; however, an alternative school may choose to 27 receive a school grade under this section in lieu of a school Florida Senate - 2008 Bill No. SB 1908

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improvement rating. Additionally, a school that serves any 28 29 combination of students in kindergarten through grade 3 which 30 does not receive a school grade because its students are not tested and included in the school grading system shall receive 31 32 the school grade designation of a K-3 feeder pattern school 33 identified by the Department of Education and verified by the 34 school district. A school feeder pattern exists if at least 60 35 percent of the students in the school serving a combination of 36 students in kindergarten through grade 3 are scheduled to be 37 assigned to the graded school. School grades itemized in subsection (2) shall be based on the following: 38

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(a)<u>1.</u> Criteria.--A school's grade shall be based on a combination of:

41 <u>a.1.</u> Student achievement scores, including achievement
42 scores for students seeking a special diploma.

43 <u>b.2.</u> Student learning gains as measured by annual FCAT
44 assessments in grades 3 through 10; learning gains for students
45 seeking a special diploma, as measured by an alternate assessment
46 tool, shall be included not later than the 2009-2010 school year.

47 <u>c.3.</u> Improvement of the lowest 25th percentile of students
48 in the school in reading, math, or writing on the FCAT, unless
49 these students are exhibiting satisfactory performance.

50 <u>2. Beginning with the 2009-2010 school year for schools</u> 51 <u>comprised of high school grades 9, 10, 11, and 12, or grades 10,</u> 52 <u>11, and 12, 50 percent of the school grade shall be based on a</u> 53 <u>combination of the factors listed in sub-subparagraphs 1.a.-c.</u> 54 <u>and the remaining 50 percent on the following factors:</u> 55 a. The high school graduation rate of the school;

56 <u>b.</u> As valid data becomes available, the performance and
 57 participation of the school's students in College Board Advanced

69	e. The growth or decline in the components listed in sub-
70	subparagraphs a. through d. from year to year.
71	(b) Student assessment data Student assessment data used
72	in determining school grades shall include:
73	1. The aggregate scores of all eligible students enrolled
74	in the school who have been assessed on the FCAT.
75	2. The aggregate scores of all eligible students enrolled
76	in the school who have been assessed on the FCAT, including
77	Florida Writes, and who have scored at or in the lowest 25th
78	percentile of students in the school in reading, math, or
79	writing, unless these students are exhibiting satisfactory
80	performance.
81	3. Effective with the 2005-2006 school year, the
82	achievement scores and learning gains of eligible students
83	attending alternative schools that provide dropout prevention and
84	academic intervention services pursuant to s. 1003.53. The term
85	"eligible students" in this subparagraph does not include
86	students attending an alternative school who are subject to
87	district school board policies for expulsion for repeated or

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serious offenses, who are in dropout retrieval programs serving 88 89 students who have officially been designated as dropouts, or who 90 are in programs operated or contracted by the Department of Juvenile Justice. The student performance data for eligible 91 92 students identified in this subparagraph shall be included in the 93 calculation of the home school's grade. For purposes of this 94 section and s. 1008.341, "home school" means the school the 95 student was attending when assigned to an alternative school. If 96 an alternative school chooses to be graded pursuant to this 97 section, student performance data for eligible students identified in this subparagraph shall not be included in the home 98 99 school's grade but shall be included only in the calculation of 100 the alternative school's grade. School districts must require collaboration between the home school and the alternative school 101 102 in order to promote student success.

103 <u>4. Beginning with the 2009-2010 school year for schools</u> 104 <u>comprised of high school grades 9, 10, 11, and 12, or grades 10,</u> 105 <u>11, and 12, the data listed in subparagraphs 1. through 3. and</u> 106 <u>the following data as the Department of Education determines such</u> 107 <u>data are valid and available:</u>

108a. The high school graduation rate of the school as109calculated by the Department of Education;

110 b. The participation rate of all eligible students enrolled 111 in the school and enrolled in College Board Advanced Placement 112 courses; International Baccalaureate courses; dual enrollment 113 courses; Advanced International Certificate of Education courses; 114 and courses or sequence of courses leading to industry 115 certification, as determined by the Agency for Workforce Innovation under s. 1003.492(2) in a career and professional 116 117 academy, as described in s. 1003.493;

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118	c. The aggregate scores of all eligible students enrolled
119	in the school in College Board Advanced Placement courses,
120	International Baccalaureate courses, and Advanced International
121	Certificate of Education courses;
122	d. Earning of college credit by all eligible students
123	enrolled in the school in dual enrollment programs under s.
124	<u>1007.271;</u>
125	e. Earning of an industry certification, as determined by
126	the Agency for Workforce Innovation under s. 1003.492(2) in a
127	career and professional academy, as described in s. 1003.493;
128	f. The aggregate scores of all eligible students enrolled
129	in the school in reading, mathematics, and other subjects as
130	measured by the SAT, ACT, and common placement test for
131	postsecondary readiness;
132	g. The high school graduation rate of all eligible at-risk
133	students enrolled in the school who scored at Level 2 or lower on
134	the 8th grade FCAT Reading and Mathematics examinations; and
135	h. The growth or decline in the data components listed in
136	sub-subparagraphs a. through g. from year to year.
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138	The State Board of Education shall adopt appropriate criteria for
139	each school grade. The criteria must also give added weight to
140	student achievement in reading. Schools designated with a grade
141	of "C," making satisfactory progress, shall be required to
142	demonstrate that adequate progress has been made by students in
143	the school who are in the lowest 25th percentile in reading,
144	math, or writing on the FCAT, including Florida Writes, unless
145	these students are exhibiting satisfactory performance. <u>Beginning</u>
146	with the 2009-2010 school year for schools comprised of high
147	school grades 9, 10, 11, and 12, or grades 10, 11, and 12, the

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148	criteria for school grades must also give added weight to the
149	graduation rate of all eligible at-risk students, as defined in
150	this paragraph. Beginning in the 2009-2010 school year, in order
151	for a high school to be designated as having a grade of "A,"
152	making excellent progress, the school must demonstrate that at-
153	risk students, as defined in this paragraph, in the school are
154	making adequate progress.
