Each provider must provide quarterly performance reports to the department. Funds shall only be released to providers whose performance reports indicate successful compliance with the performance measures described in the contract.

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The Department of Corrections shall develop and use a uniform format and uniform methodologies for the purpose of reporting annually to the Governor and to the Legislature on the state prison system. Such reports shall include a comprehensive plan for current facility use and any departures from planned facility use, including opening new facilities, renovating or closing existing facilities, and advancing or delaying the opening of new or renovated facilities. The report shall include the maximum capacity of currently operating facilities and the potential maximum capacity of facilities that the department could make operational within the fiscal year. The report shall also identify appropriate sites for future facilities and provide information to support specified locations, such as availability of personnel in local labor markets. Reports should include updated infrastructure needs for existing or future facilities. Each report should reconcile capacity figures to the immediately preceding report. For the purpose of this paragraph, maximum capacity shall be calculated and displayed pursuant to section 944.023(1)(b), Florida Statutes. The department may provide additional analysis of current and future bed needs based on such factors as deemed necessary by the Secretary. The next report shall be due January 1, 2015.

From the funds in Specific Appropriations 598 through 786, the department may work within its existing budget, including applicable grants, to implement any corrective action plan that is developed as the result of a Prison Rape Elimination Act audit conducted in accordance with Title 23, Part 115 of the Code of Federal Regulations. The department may request additional resources required through the Legislative Budget Request process as defined in chapter 216, Florida Statutes.

From the funds in Specific Appropriations 625 through 721 and 735 through 744, \$675,000 in nonrecurring general revenue funds is provided for Operation New Hope's Ready4Work re-entry initiative to reduce recidivism. Operation New Hope will provide pre-release services including risk assessment, a plan-of-care, career development and life skills training, and employment and treatment referrals for incarcerated inmates who are within one year of release from a Department of Corrections' facility. Operation New Hope will provide post-release services including case management, career development and life skills training, life-coaching (mentoring), family reunification, and job placement assistance to offenders under community supervision and to persons who enter the Ready4Work program within one year after release from incarceration in a Department of Corrections' facility. Inmates, offenders on community supervision, and recently released offenders who are transitioning back into the communities and workforce of Duval County and surrounding counties are eligible to participate. The Department of Corrections shall provide a quarterly performance report of the program to the Governor, the chair of the Senate Appropriations Committee and the chair of the House Appropriations Committee beginning October 1, 2014.

From the funds in Specific Appropriations 625 through 721 and 735 through 744, \$250,000 in nonrecurring general revenue funds are provided for the Ready4Work-Hillsborough re-entry program, which replicates the Operation New Hope Ready4Work program with the goal of reducing recidivism. Ready4Work-Hillsborough will provide pre-release services including risk assessment, a plan-of-care, career development and life skills training, and referrals for incarcerated inmates who are within one year of release from a Department of Corrections' facility. Ready4Work-Hillsborough will provide post-release services including case management, career development and life skills training, life-coaching (mentoring), family reunification, and job placement assistance to offenders under community supervision and to persons who enter the Ready4Work program within one year after release from incarceration in a Department of Corrections' facility. Funds used for startup activities for Ready4Work-Hillsborough may not exceed 25 percent of the total funds appropriated. Inmates, offenders on community
