- (2) <u>(a)</u> The 24 credits may be earned through applied, integrated, and combined courses approved by the Department of Education and shall be distributed as follows:
 - 1. (a) Sixteen core curriculum credits:
- \underline{a} . Four credits in English, with major concentration in composition, reading for information, and literature.
- <u>b.</u> 2. Four credits in mathematics, one of which must be Algebra I, a series of courses equivalent to Algebra I, or a higher-level mathematics course. School districts are encouraged to set specific goals to increase enrollments in, and successful completion of, geometry and Algebra II.
- $\underline{\text{c. 3.}}$ Three credits in science, two of which must have a laboratory component.
- <u>d.</u> 4. Three credits in social studies as follows: one credit in American history; one credit in world history; one-

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half credit in economics; and one-half credit in American government.

- e. 5. One credit in fine or performing arts, speech and debate, or a practical arts course that incorporates artistic content and techniques of creativity, interpretation, and imagination. Eligible practical arts courses shall be identified through the Course Code Directory.
- f. 6. One credit in physical education to include integration of health. Participation in an interscholastic sport at the junior varsity or varsity level for two full seasons shall satisfy the one-credit requirement in physical education if the student passes a competency test on personal fitness with a score of "C" or better. The competency test on personal fitness must be developed by the Department of Education. A district school board may not require that the one credit in physical education be taken during the 9th grade year. Completion of one semester with a grade of "C" or better in a marching band class, in a physical activity class that requires participation in marching band activities as an extracurricular activity, or in a dance class shall satisfy one-half credit in physical education or one-half credit in performing arts. This credit may not be used to satisfy the personal fitness requirement or the requirement for adaptive physical education under an individual education plan (IEP) or 504 plan. Completion of 2 years in a Reserve Officer Training Corps (R.O.T.C.) class, a significant component of which is drills, shall satisfy the one-credit requirement in physical education and the one-credit requirement in performing arts. This credit may not be used to satisfy the personal fitness requirement or the requirement for

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adaptive physical education under an individual education plan (IEP) or 504 plan.

2. (b) Eight credits in majors, minors, or electives:

- <u>a.</u> 1. Four credits in a major area of interest, such as sequential courses in a career and technical program, fine and performing arts, or academic content area, selected by the student as part of the education plan required by s. 1003.4156. Students may revise major areas of interest each year as part of annual course registration processes and should update their education plan to reflect such revisions. Annually by October 1, the district school board shall approve major areas of interest and submit the list of majors to the Commissioner of Education for approval. Each major area of interest shall be deemed approved unless specifically rejected by the commissioner within 60 days. Upon approval, each district's major areas of interest shall be available for use by all school districts and shall be posted on the department's website.
- <u>b.</u> 2. Four credits in elective courses selected by the student as part of the education plan required by s. 1003.4156. These credits may be combined to allow for a second major area of interest pursuant to <u>sub-subparagraph a. subparagraph 1.</u>, a minor area of interest, elective courses, or intensive reading or mathematics intervention courses as described in this <u>sub-subparagraph</u>.
- (I) a. Minor areas of interest are composed of three credits selected by the student as part of the education plan required by s. 1003.4156 and approved by the district school board.
- (II) b. Elective courses are selected by the student in order to pursue a complete education program as described in s.

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1001.41(3) and to meet eligibility requirements for scholarships.

(III) e- For each year in which a student scores at Level 1 on FCAT Reading, the student must be enrolled in and complete an intensive reading course the following year. Placement of Level 2 readers in either an intensive reading course or a content area course in which reading strategies are delivered shall be determined by diagnosis of reading needs. The department shall provide quidance on appropriate strategies for diagnosing and meeting the varying instructional needs of students reading below grade level. Reading courses shall be designed and offered pursuant to the comprehensive reading plan required by s. 1011.62(9). A student who scores at Level 1 or Level 2 on FCAT Reading, but who did not score below Level 3 on FCAT Reading in any previous year, may be exempt from the requirement in this sub-sub-subparagraph if the student demonstrates acceptable performance on an alternative standardized reading assessment approved by the State Board of Education. The requirements in this sub-sub-subparagraph do not apply to a student who has earned a passing score on grade 10 FCAT Reading pursuant to s. 1008.22(3)(c) or who has achieved a score on a standardized test which is concordant with a passing score on grade 10 FCAT Reading pursuant to s. 1008.22(10).

(IV) d. For each year in which a student scores at Level 1 or Level 2 on FCAT Mathematics, the student must receive remediation the following year. These courses may be taught through applied, integrated, or combined courses and are subject to approval by the department for inclusion in the Course Code Directory. The requirements of this sub-sub-subparagraph do not apply to a student who has earned a passing score on grade 10

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- FCAT Mathematics pursuant to s. 1008.22(3)(c) or who has achieved a score on a standardized test which is concordant with a passing score on grade 10 FCAT Mathematics pursuant to s. 1008.22(10).
- (b) Beginning with students entering grade 9 in the 2010-2011 school year, the 24 credits may be earned through applied, integrated, and combined courses approved by the Department of Education and shall be distributed as follows:
 - 1. Sixteen and one-half core curriculum credits:
- a. Four credits in English, with major concentration in composition, reading for information, and literature.
- b. Four credits in mathematics, one of which must be Algebra I or a series of courses equivalent to Algebra I as approved by the State Board of Education, and one credit must be geometry or a series of courses equivalent to geometry as approved by the State Board of Education. Beginning with students entering grade 9 in the 2012-2013 school year, one of the four credits must be Algebra I or a series of courses equivalent to Algebra I as approved by the State Board of Education, one credit must be geometry or a series of courses equivalent to geometry as approved by the State Board of Education, and one credit must be Algebra II or a series of courses equivalent to Algebra II as approved by the State Board of Education.
- c. Three credits in science. One of the three credits must be Biology I or a series of courses equivalent to Biology I as approved by the State Board of Education, one credit must be a physical science or a series of courses equivalent to a physical science as approved by the State Board of Education, and one credit must be a higher-level science course. At least two of

with students entering grade 9 in the 2012-2013 school year, one of the three credits must be Biology I or a series of courses equivalent to Biology I as approved by the State Board of Education, one credit must be chemistry or a series of courses equivalent to chemistry as approved by the State Board of Education, and one credit must be a higher-level science course. At least two of the science courses must have a laboratory component.

- d. Three credits in social studies as follows: one credit in American history; one credit in world history; one-half credit in economics; and one-half credit in American government.
- e. One credit in fine or performing arts, speech and debate, or a practical arts course that incorporates artistic content and techniques of creativity, interpretation, and imagination. Eligible practical arts courses shall be identified through the Course Code Directory.
- f. One credit in physical education. Participation in an interscholastic sport at the junior varsity or varsity level for two full seasons shall satisfy the one-credit requirement in physical education if the student passes a competency test on personal fitness with a score of "C" or better. The competency test on personal fitness must be developed by the Department of Education. A district school board may not require that the one credit in physical education be taken during the 9th grade year. Completion of one semester with a grade of "C" or better in a marching band class, in a physical activity class that requires participation in marching band activities as an extracurricular activity, or in a dance class shall satisfy one-half credit in physical education or one-half credit in performing arts. - g. One-half credit in health education. The health education requirement may be waived if the student requests to take the health education assessment and scores a "C" or better.

 The Department of Education shall develop the health education assessment.
- 2. Seven and one-half credits in majors, minors, or electives:
- a. Four credits in a major area of interest, such as sequential courses in a career and technical program, fine and performing arts, or academic content area, selected by the student as part of the education plan required by s. 1003.4156. Students may revise major areas of interest each year as part of annual course registration processes and should update their education plan to reflect such revisions. Annually by October 1, the district school board shall approve major areas of interest and submit the list of majors to the Commissioner of Education for approval. Each major area of interest shall be deemed approved unless specifically rejected by the commissioner within 60 days. Upon approval, each district's major areas of interest

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shall be available for use by all school districts and shall be

posted on the department's website.

- b. Three and one-half credits in elective courses selected by the student as part of the education plan required by s. 1003.4156. These credits may be combined to allow for a second major area of interest pursuant to subparagraph 1., a minor area of interest, elective courses, or intensive reading or mathematics intervention courses as described in this subsubparagraph.
- (I) Minor areas of interest are composed of three credits selected by the student as part of the education plan required by s. 1003.4156 and approved by the district school board.
- (II) Elective courses are selected by the student in order to pursue a complete education program as described in s. 1001.41(3) and to meet eligibility requirements for scholarships.
- (III) For each year in which a student scores at Level 1 on FCAT Reading, the student must be enrolled in and complete an intensive reading course the following year. Placement of Level 2 readers in either an intensive reading course or a content area course in which reading strategies are delivered shall be determined by diagnosis of reading needs. The department shall provide quidance on appropriate strategies for diagnosing and meeting the varying instructional needs of students reading below grade level. Reading courses shall be designed and offered pursuant to the comprehensive reading plan required by s. 1011.62(9). A student who scores at Level 1 or Level 2 on FCAT Reading, but who did not score below Level 3 on FCAT Reading in any previous year, may be exempt from the requirement in this sub-sub-subparagraph if the student demonstrates acceptable





CS/HB 1293 Relating to Graduation Requirements by Rep. Fresen

The Foundation asks that you vote <u>YES</u> on <u>CS</u>/HB 1293 by Rep. Fresen in the Full Appropriations Council on Education & Economic Development on March 30th. To provide for our state's future economic growth, the **21st Century Diploma Initiative** raises high school graduation standards to ensure Florida's students are prepared to compete in the global marketplace.

Despite a recent overall ranking of tenth in the nation for quality of education by the highly respected annual report card issued by *Education Week*, Florida failed in the category of "college readiness," scoring an F with an abysmal 50 out of 100 points. The 21st Century Diploma Initiative features measures to increase graduation requirements to ensure our students are ready for college and the workforce.

A U.S. Department of Education study found that students who completed at least Algebra II were more prepared for college. In fact, raising standards benefits minority students the most, narrowing the achievement gap.

- Raising Math and Science Standards: The legislation raises the standard diploma requirements to new 21st Century Diploma graduation requirements. Starting in two school years, freshmen in the class of 2014 will be required to take Algebra I <u>plus</u> geometry for two out of their four math courses. Additionally, Biology I will be required as one of their three courses in science. In four years, freshmen in the class of 2016 will be required to take Algebra I, geometry, <u>plus</u> Algebra II as three of their four required math courses. For science, students will be required to take Biology I <u>plus</u> chemistry as two of their three courses.
- Raising the Bar for Graduation: The bill requires students receive a grade-level score on the state assessment to graduate. Right now, a student can graduate high school with a <u>below grade-level</u> score on the test.
- **Enhancing Bright Futures:** The bill aligns Bright Futures Scholarships with the 21st Century Diploma requirements. To make the Bright Futures program a little brighter, the legislation ensures scholarship recipients are prepared to succeed at Florida universities and colleges.

- (a) By May 1 of each year, each supplemental educational services provider must report to the department, unless a prior agreement has been made with the local school district, in an electronic form prescribed by the department, the following information regarding services provided to public school students in the district:
- 1. Student learning gains as demonstrated by mastery of applicable benchmarks or access points set forth in the Sunshine State Standards;
 - 2. Student attendance and completion data;
 - 3. Parent satisfaction survey results;

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4. School district satisfaction survey results received directly from the school district; and

5. Satisfaction survey results received directly from the school district from principals in whose schools supplemental educational services were provided on site.

The Department shall provide a uniform survey to be completed online for principals and school districts.

The Department of Education shall assign to each state-approved supplemental educational services provider one of the following grades, defined according to rules of the State Board of Education:

- 1. "A," providing superior service.
- 2. "B," providing above satisfactory service.
- 3. "C," providing satisfactory service.
- 4. "D," providing below satisfactory service.
- 5. "F," providing unsatisfactory service.
- The department shall evaluate each state-approved (b) provider using the information received pursuant to paragraph (a) and assign a service designation of excellent, satisfactory, or unsatisfactory for the prior school year. However, if the student population served by the provider does not meet the minimum sample size necessary, based on accepted professional practice for statistical reliability and the prevention of the unlawful release of personally identifiable student information, the provider will not receive a service designation. The department shall specify, by rule, the threshold requirements for assigning the service designations; however, the service designations must be based primarily on student learning gains. By July 1 of each year, the department must report the service designation to the supplemental educational services providers, the school districts, parents, and the public. A state-approved supplemental educational services provider's grade shall be
