SELECTION AND ADOPTION OF INSTRUCTIONAL MATERIALS.-

12 (a) The department shall notify all publishers and 13 manufacturers of instructional materials who have submitted bids that within 3 weeks after the deadline for receiving bids, at a 14 15 designated time and place, it will open the bids submitted and 16 deposited with it. At the time and place designated, the bids 17 shall be opened, read, and tabulated in the presence of the 18 bidders or their representatives. No one may revise his or her 19 bid after the bids have been filed. When all bids have been

carefully considered, the commissioner shall, from the list of 20 suitable, usable, and desirable instructional materials reported 21 22 by the state instructional materials committee, select and adopt instructional materials for each grade and subject field in the 23 curriculum of public elementary, middle, and high schools in 24 25 which adoptions are made and in the subject areas designated in the advertisement. The adoption shall continue for the period 26 27 specified in the advertisement, beginning on the ensuing April 28 1. The adoption shall not prevent the extension of a contract as provided in subsection (3). The commissioner shall always 29 reserve the right to reject any and all bids. The commissioner 30 31 may ask for new sealed bids from publishers or manufacturers whose instructional materials were recommended by the state 32 instructional materials committee as suitable, usable, and 33 desirable; specify the dates for filing such bids and the date 34 35 on which they shall be opened; and proceed in all matters 36 regarding the opening of bids and the awarding of contracts as required by this part. In all cases, bids shall be accompanied 37 38 by a cash deposit or certified check of from \$500 to \$2,500, as 39 the commissioner may direct. The department, in adopting instructional materials, shall give due consideration both to 40 the prices bid for furnishing instructional materials and to the 41 42 report and recommendations of the state instructional materials committee. When the commissioner has finished with the report of 43 the state instructional materials committee, the report shall be 44 45 filed and preserved with the department and shall be available 46 at all times for public inspection.
