Re: Strike all to House Bill 225

Dear Christa,

Thank you for allowing us to provide comment to House bill 225. The Florida Pharmacy Association appreciates the opportunity to share its thoughts on health care related issues that affect pharmacy stakeholder groups.

House bill 225 as originally filed revises Florida Statutes 465.0276 which sets a standard on practitioner dispensing of controlled substances listed in schedule II, schedule III or schedule IV by limiting the dispensed quantity to a 72 hour supply by registered dispensing practitioners. It is our understanding that this limit does not alter the quantity that a pharmacy may dispense under other provisions in F.S. 465. The Florida Pharmacy Association favors this provision and would like to share with you the following:

- 1. FPA Review of HB225 The Florida Pharmacy Association at its annual meeting last summer reviewed some of the issues surrounding the illegal use of legal drugs and the prescription drug monitoring program. If you may recall the FPA spent a considerable amount of time and effort to work with the Florida legislature during the 2009 session. We were successful in bringing together the various stakeholder groups to finally get general support for Senate bill 462. At the same time during the annual meeting our members had concerns over the significant dispensing of controlled substances from prescriber offices. We are concerned with the absence of pharmacist review, intervention and management of patients who are being treated for pain. While we recognize the convenience that patients will experience when medications are dispensed from the prescriber's office we are concerned that the patient (who may be on other medications prescribed by other practitioners and obtained from their community pharmacies) will not be monitored properly. This is very critical for patients who are paying cash for their prescriptions and not being monitored in integrated databases. The FPA adopted as policy language strikingly similar to the original language published in HB225.
- 2. Other state's issues with Florida The FPA continues to hear from our colleagues in other states who have concerns with the prescribing patterns of Florida practitioners. Included in these comments is a newsletter from the Ohio Board of Pharmacy dated May 2009. In that newsletter the Ohio Board of Pharmacy published information to its 14,000 pharmacists warning them of drug scam involving prescriptions issued by Florida doctors. The FPA is troubled that another state would message its licensees on issues that our state is struggling to address. It is clear that Ohio has placed Florida in the cross hairs of the diversion radar scope.

We also found a presentation from Virginia where they specifically used Florida as an example of out of state prescriptions that are issued from Florida prescribers.

Below is text that we found on the North Carolina Board of Pharmacy's web site that was published on March 12, 2009:

THURSDAY, MARCH 12, 2009

Alert to Pharmacists about Possible Fraudulent Prescriptions: The Board of Pharmacy has received information from DEA and other sources that carloads of patients from Kentucky, Tennessee, and Ohio, are going to see physicians and pain management centers in Florida, specifically in Boca Raton and Fort Lauderdale. The patients are being issued prescriptions for Oxycodone and other Schedule II narcotics, primarily Roxcicodone.

The patients are stopping at pharmacies, primarily in Western North Carolina, asking to get the prescriptions filled. Sometimes they are calling ahead asking if pharmacies have Oxycodone and they say there is a shortage of Oxycodone in their home state.

Pharmacists calling one clinic in Florida did not specifically speak with the prescribing physician but reached a clinic manager on his cell who verified the prescriptions. If the phone number starts with a 954 area code, these are probably fraudulent prescriptions.

Pharmacists should be wary of filling any prescriptions for Schedule II narcotics unless you are familiar with the patient and know that a prior patient-prescriber relationship existed.

If you have had contact with any of these groups, physicians, etc., please contact the Board office, specifically the Investigations Department, at 919-246-1050.

While the above issues are apparent with the prescribing of controlled substances we do believe that the problems cross over considerably with the significant amount of dispensing that is going on in South Florida pain clinics. For your consideration I have also included a presentation by the United States Drug Enforcement Administration at a meeting of the National Association of Boards of Pharmacy in Miami, Florida during the month of May of 2009. Please pay particular attention to slide number 30 related to dispensing from pain clinics.

- 3. FPA Review of the Strike All: The proposed strike all version for House bill 225 retains the dispensing restrictions on prescribers. There is also language that places new regulatory standards on pharmacy businesses seeking to operate in Florida by requiring them to be part of a multi-state electronic prescribing network. While we fully support the revision of prescribing initiatives we would like to share our thoughts on the other initiatives.
 - a. Requirement is universally applied –Some community pharmacies primary function would be to service hospice, terminally ill or cancer patients. Many of these patients receive prescriptions that are classified as controlled substances. Currently the drug enforcement administration does not allow for medications of this nature to be prescribed electronically thus placing a Florida regulatory mandate on a pharmacy business to enroll in something that is not currently permitted by Federal laws. These pharmacies would be required to sign up for and purchase technology that will be minimally used adding significant business expenses that are not reimbursed. It is our understanding that with changes in the banking industry small businesses (including pharmacies) have experienced difficulty in getting loans for capital improvement programs. There will be considerable investment needed by pharmacies who may have

to upgrade their pharmacy dispensing software to become more compliant with the only multi-state electronic prescribing network that we are aware of.

- b. Intent of the legislation to resolve the issue Our understanding that requiring pharmacies to sign up for the electronic prescribing network as a condition of receiving a permit should address issues related to patients receiving medications that are not recorded in a management database. We are unable to establish how putting all Florida licensed pharmacies in the electronic prescribing network will resolve the prescribing issues that Florida is having difficulty with related to controlled substances. While there are incentive programs in place to encourage prescribers to transition to electronic health records and electronic prescribing those incentives do not address patients who see their prescribing practitioner and pay cash for their visit. We understand that the incentives are for enhanced payment for Medicare claims that are filed through various health plans. These patients are not using a health benefit to obtain controlled substance prescriptions and thus are not going to be captured by pain clinics whose scope is limited to these services. Again the Federal government currently does not allow controlled substance prescriptions to transmit through the electronic prescribing network.
- c. Cost to pharmacy providers Pharmacy stakeholders have been willing and eager to assist the state in resolving health care issues. We recognize that on occasion we are asked to come to the table to contribute to improve the quality of health and support innovative systems to make life better for Florida citizens. Through the years we have worked diligently to create awareness of the advantages of electronic prescribing and how it helps with many patient safety issues. The system is not entirely fool proof and some system related issues are still to be worked out. The electronic prescribing system mandated by the strike will add significant costs to pharmacy providers when many are facing deep cuts in Medicaid and other third party programs. Recently a pharmacy owner testified before both the House and Senate Health Appropriations Committee where she informed members that she is now providing many state mandated services to Medicaid patients at a business loss.

The cost associated with each prescription that is transmitted over the electronic prescribing network is assessed to the receiving pharmacy. It is our understanding that the pharmacy must eat this cost even if the patient does not get the prescription filled. Keep in mind that for insurance prescriptions the pharmacy will also be billed for transmission costs to file electronic claims on behalf of the patient. That means that the pharmacy will have to bear costs on the front end as well as the back end. There are additional costs from having to message prescribers to clarify information that may be missing or confusing.

Again we appreciate the opportunity to provide our thoughts on HB225 and wish to work with Representative Legg on this project. We believe that Florida pharmacists have worked very well with the Department of Health and law enforcement to resolve diversion issues. From much of what we are seeing from other states and from the Drug Enforcement Administration we are not convinced that pharmacy providers are the nucleus to Florida's problems with overprescribing of controlled substances. Pharmacies by law cannot provide prescription medications unless ordered by a duly licensed practitioner.

For a project of this nature to work any proposed legislation will need to not only address the registration of dispensing pharmacies in the electronic prescribing network but there must also be similar obligations placed on the prescriber community. As Executive Vice President and CEO of the

Florida Pharmacy Association it has been my honor to serve as a member of the Florida's Electronic Prescribing Advisory Panel facilitated by the Agency for Health Care Administration. During a meeting on January 28, 2010 of that panel some interesting metrics was shared with the group on electronic prescribing. Please consider the following:

- Data provided by AHCA on pharmacies activated to accept e-prescriptions suggested that the overwhelming majority of Florida pharmacies are enabled and connected to the e-prescribing networks with the exception of the Miami – Ft. Lauderdale area. Only 47.6% of those pharmacies are activated. Statewide the uptake of activated e-prescribing pharmacies ranged from a low of 68.6% of the studied population to a high of 86% (excluding Miami – Ft. Lauderdale). Clearly this shows pharmacies true commitment to e-prescribing.
- Additional data presented at that meeting showed where only 7% of licensed providers were "active e-prescribing practitioners" in the Miami – Fort Lauderdale area. In all other areas of Florida the percent of active e-prescribing practitioners to licensed providers ranged from a low of 4% to only a high of 27% in the AHCA study.
- We also learned at this meeting that while the number of electronic prescriptions transmitted over the network has increased dramatically over the past few years it still represents only 19% of total prescriptions in the AHCA study.

With the above in mind it is clear that in pharmacy we are doing our part to facilitate greater connectivity to multi-state electronic prescribing networks. Pharmacies that are not activated but will be obligated to under the proposed strike will face significant and overwhelming financial commitments. Some older dispensing software that smaller pharmacies are using will have to be upgraded in order to connect properly. This software and its technical support needed are not inexpensive. We see the strike all to HB225 as a considerable unfunded tax on pharmacy businesses to connect to technology that has not been widely adopted by the prescriber community. At some point in time we welcome the opportunity for all prescriptions to be facilitated through a multi-state electronic prescribing network but to do so properly there has to be some preliminary issues resolved.

- 1. There needs to be a viable resolution on the electronic prescribing of controlled substances from the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA). Currently controlled substance prescriptions cannot be transmitted over a multi-state electronic prescribing network. The DEA has been looking at this issue for sometime but has not published any guidance on this to date.
- 2. If there is interest in regulating pharmacies to participate in multi-state electronic prescribing networks there must also be concurrent regulations on the prescriber stakeholders as well. This regulation will need to be structured to hold the prescriber accountable for creating a prescription record outside of the multi-state electronic prescribing network and not holding the pharmacy liable. The system will not work at all without these issues being resolved.

Finally if you wish to control flooding along the length of a river you don't build the dam where it empties into the ocean.
