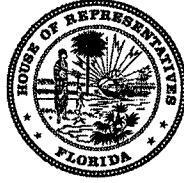

RE: Interim guidance regarding the Office of Fiscal Accountability and Regulatory Reform

On August 16, 2011, a five-member majority of the Florida Supreme Court issued an unsigned opinion in the *Whiley v. Scott* case, holding that the Governor may not, pursuant to Executive Order 11-72, require agencies to obtain formal approval from the Office of Fiscal Accountability and Regulatory Reform (OFARR) prior to publishing rulemaking notices. While the Governor firmly believes that the majority opinion is illogical and grossly misreads the Florida Constitution, OFARR will nonetheless adjust its policies and procedures to comply with the Court's ruling. These changes will be memorialized in a forthcoming executive order, but this memorandum will serve as interim guidance for agencies.

Pursuant to the Governor's prior delegation and instruction, as well as statutory mandates, OFARR will continue to advise the Governor on agency rulemaking. In so doing, OFARR will advance the mission it was charged with in Executive Orders 11-01 and 11-72—to make regulation less burdensome on citizens, taxpayers, and businesses; to ensure that agencies operate more efficiently and cooperatively; and to aid the Governor in taking care that agency rulemaking faithfully executes legislative enactments. To advance these objectives, OFARR will continue to require each agency to provide information about its rulemaking activities and will continue to provide advice and commentary on proposed rulemaking actions.

OFARR will return all pending rule authorization requests to their respective agencies. Agencies, if they so choose, may proceed to publish these notices in accordance with Section 120.54, Florida Statutes. With respect to any requests for authorization that OFARR had previously denied, agencies may proceed with such rulemaking if they so choose, but agencies should note that OFARR's previously expressed guidance with respect to such proposed rulemaking represents the strongly held views of the Office of the Governor as to the efficacy and propriety of the proposed action.

As Executive Order 11-72 explains, the Governor has the constitutional authority to “require information in writing from all executive or administrative state ... officers upon any subject relating to the duties of their respective offices.” Art. IV, § 1(a), Fla. Const. Accordingly, for any rulemaking notices that an agency plans to publish between today and the date of the new executive order, the agency should continue to transmit to OFARR the previously requested documentation. For these purposes, OFARR will provide a Rulemaking Notification Form in place of the Rulemaking Authorization Form. The requested information should be submitted to OFARR prior to submission for publication. Formal authorization by OFARR to publish, however, is not required.

The Comprehensive Rule Review is now complete. Thank you for working so hard to complete a thorough and thoughtful review of all rules in an effort to rid the state of unnecessary or overly burdensome regulation.

Each agency directly subject to EO 11-72 must begin the repeal process according to the repeal schedule set forth below. **This process will address only those rules that were identified for full repeal, not revision or deletion of a subsection.** The staggered schedule helps to manage the demands placed on entities such as the Department of State (DOS), the Joint Administrative Procedures Committee (JAPC), the Small Business Regulatory Advisory Council (SBRAC), and the Office of Fiscal Accountability and Regulatory Reform (OFARR) as these repeals are processed.

* These agencies, and the professional boards housed within DOH and DBPR, are not directly subject to EO 11-72 but have voluntarily complied with the rule review utilizing the OFARR process. This repeal procedure has been developed including these agencies to provide further assistance from OFARR.

Office of Fiscal Accountability and Regulatory Reform Follow-Up to Comprehensive Rule Review

If the repeal process is on or ahead of schedule, and especially as rules are routed through DOS, OFARR, JAPC, or SBRAC, the schedule may be altered to move more quickly.

Repeal Process

1. *Access your agency's report* at <https://www.myfloridalicense.com/rulereview/Rule-Review-Reports.html>. This link shows all rules agencies flagged for repeal.
2. *Group your rules for repeal.* You may want to do them all at once or stagger them. Your decision should be governed by the fact that each stage is two months long, and every Notice of Proposed Rule should be submitted for publication in those two months. Other rulemaking activities can and will take place outside of the first two months. To expedite the process for agencies with many rules to repeal, the rules should be divided into batches by considering subject matter, complexity, and likelihood for public input in the repeal process.
3. *Prepare the rule repeal package* using the OFARR templates (attached) The rule repeal package consists of the following documents which must be completed before submitting to OFARR:
 - A Repeal Request Form
 - A copy of the Notice of Proposed Rule (Repeal)
 - A copy of the SERC Determination Checklist
 - A copy of the SERC, if required

Note: Please fill out the request form in detail but do not attach a print out of the rule review questionnaire. OFARR can access the questionnaire in the database if necessary to explain why the rule is being repealed.

4. *Obtain agency head approval* using your agency's internal process.
5. *Submit all required documents to OFARR* for authorization. Send all documents electronically to Reg.Reform@MyFlorida.com. Please type the rule number (or chapter number for multiple rules) and "Comprehensive Repeal Process" in the subject line to distinguish these authorizations from regular rulemaking authorizations.

6. *If a SERC has been prepared, OFARR will forward the entire package to SBRAC for review. Section 120.54(3)(b)1., F.S., requires a SERC even for a repeal if the repeal triggers the thresholds in section 120.54(3)(b)1.a. and b., F.S.*
7. *Upon receipt of OFARR authorization, proceed with the normal rulemaking process, including submission of the notice(s) to JAPC and at www.flrules.org.*
8. *Contact OFARR to report any situation for which the repeal may be delayed.*
9. *Move forward with certification and adoption as quickly as possible. OFARR authorization is not required.*

The Florida Legislature wants to know about government rules and regulations that impose unreasonable burdens on you. The Legislature has the responsibility to supervise the power of agencies and local governments to adopt rules and regulations that may control private and commercial conduct. The Legislature often allows agencies and local governments to adopt rules and regulations to protect the health, safety, and welfare of Floridians.

Experience, however, shows that some rules and regulations may be poorly conceived, do not achieve their intended purposes, or are otherwise unreasonably burdensome compared to their actual benefits. When a rule is adopted by an agency or a regulation is adopted by a local government the Legislature may not be aware of the actual burdens created. Your contributions to this survey can help the Legislature overcome this information gap. Floridians affected by rules and regulations are best able to identify whether or not they impose unacceptable burdens.

This survey asks a series of questions intended to help you identify and describe specific burdensome rules or regulations. Whenever possible, please provide the official title and number of any rule or ordinance that concerns you. You may complete the survey as often as you like to report on any number of rules or regulations. Please complete only one survey per rule or regulation. The Legislature will be reviewing the nature and descriptions of your concerns rather than merely counting opposition to particular rules. A rule or regulation that is burdensome to just one Floridian is worthy of serious reconsideration. That process begins with your participation.

For purposes of this survey, a rule or regulation is "burdensome" if it is:

County and municipal ordinances and regulations also are numbered but the format differs between local governments. If you are reporting a burdensome local ordinance or regulation, the number and heading should be available in your local county or municipal code.

You may also report burdensome federal regulations. These are found in the Code of Federal Regulations and also follow a standard format of title, chapter, and section, as in the following example: 1 CFR 2.003.


