

Student Financial Aid Opportunities

The programs below represent most of the common tools/resources financial aid administrators use to fill (from the bottom up) a financial aid package per student each year.

Every student is awarded *individually* according to their specific financial needs.

Financial aid administrators package each students financial aid according to their *institutions cost and the students eligibility*.

Flexibility within the financial aid packaging of awards is *critical* for financial aid offices to accommodate individual student needs.
