$501 \mathrm{C}(3)$ - Non-Profit Organization

- By Laws establish the organization will follow "Government in the Sunshine"



## Non-Profit Athletic Organization

Factors to consider when judging finances of FHSAA:

- Not a foundation
- No grants
- Not reliant on public donations
- Has to generate resources through events and fees
- Form 990 is not the only public information on FHSAA (subject to Florida's Public Record Law)
- Operates similar to other state athletic associations

## The Business of FHSAA - Myths \& Truth

Myth
Perceived as relying on Public Funds (taxes)
Truth

- FHSAA does NOT receive state funding or tax dollars
- FHSAA Policy requires member schools only use nonpublic funds to pay FHSAA dues, fees and fines
- Public Schools rely heavily on Activity Funds from ticket sales, fund raisers and donations to fund Athletics

## Funding a Non-Profit Athletic Organization

Choices are made to rely on resources that best serve the purpose of the organization at the least cost to those it serves (member schools)

Types of Resources:

- Member Dues \& Fees
- Service Fees
- Fines
- Corporate Support \& Royalties
- Athletic Event Fees \& Ticket Sales
- Interest on Investments

Perceived as relying on Penalties/Fines for funding
Truth
Less than 3\% of resources are Fines ( $2013-14$ FY) (\$112,739 Public, \$23,460 Private Schools, $\$ 14,530$ Officials)


## Financial Goal

"Fund the organization with 100\% ticket sales from State Finals, Sponsorships, Media contracts, and Royalties so there is No Financial Burden to our Schools"


Understanding the Budget 2013-2014 Results:

Beginning Balances
$\$ 4,985,444$
Plus Revenue (income)
Less Expenses
= Ending Balances
$\$ 5,297,426$
$\$(5,032,501)$
$\$ 5,250,369$

During FY12-13 balances increased by $\$ 264,925$ Ending Balance is $99 \%$ of revenue, goal is $100 \%$

## FLORIDA <br> G1F

Member Survey's in 2012 focused on opinions about funding sources for FHSAA -- Results were:
\#1 - Member fees should be reduced to nominal amounts
\#2 - Event fees for Preseason Classics \& large tournaments should be reduced over time, but are reasonable means of funding
\#3 - Fines should give way to more meaningful restrictions (loss of membership, loss of eligibility to play in state series, loss of \# of contests, etc)
\#4 - Post season state series events (share of gate) is the most reasonable source to fund the organization

- Hosting is optional but member dues impact all members


2. Fund the Organization through sources other than memberships and school derived resources:
$\$ 1,256,225$ Corporate \& Royalties


## Financial - Strategy

2. Fund the Organization through sources other than memberships, regular season events and fines:

State Series - Post Season - District through State SemiFinals and Championships

\$2.1 Million Income

Financial - Strategies
3. Eliminate revenue sharing from regular season events


Membership fees are $\$ 25$ per high school, $\$ 10$ per middle school (down from a range of $\$ 300$ to $\$ 1,100$ )
Legal fees are shared each year by splitting the prior year general legal costs of the association among all high school members - 2014 fee is $\$ 167$ high school, $\$ 25$ middle school

Sport Sanction Fees are assessed on large tournaments and average $\$ 70$ per tournament - these fees are being phased out over next 2 yrs
Service Fees in the budget consist primarily of Officials registrations

## Third Party Fees

- Direct contracts between FHSAA and Non-Member organizations that host events involving our member schools or out of state schools that require National Federal Approval
- Examples: Disney; KSA, Paragon Sports; ESPN
- Hosted and organized by $3^{\text {rd }}$ Party, our schools may be participating
- Provides emerging source of revenue to the organization to support high sports and saves our member schools by providing a constant revenue stream (in place of member dues, etc)
- Requires proper insurance coverage by the $3^{\text {rd }}$ Party to protect the organization and member schools that participate
- Will provide approximately sio, ooo revenue in 2014-15
- According to the NFHS, Florida has more third party events than any other state (popular destination for out of state teams)

Regular season is $100 \%$ school resource (nothing to FHSAA unless large tournament)
Post Season: FHSAA State Series are trademarked events leading to State Finals
$\$ 8+$ Million (tickets, concessions, parking and team pay for championships) stays at school
3,678+ State Series Events are Hosted by Schools
Schools Share of Gate Receipts for District \& Region:
$100 \%$ for 24 sports
$85 \%$ for 7 sports (baseball, boys \& girls basketball, boys \& girls soccer, softball, girls volleyball)
$75 \%$ for football

## How Revenue Sharing Works

- Applies to 8 team sports in the State Series
- Schools choose to host (not mandatory)
- FHSAA takes the share of gate from the larger "profit" events and then pays those that have a loss
- 2,215 events subject to "percentage of gate" policy
- 1,495 paid FHSAA a share ( $70 \%$ had good profits)
- 468 did not pay FHSAA, but broke even
- 252 events lost money and FHSAA assisted them with loss funds
- Member schools have consistently voted this method of funding as the number one choice for funding FHSAA




## Financial Reform

FHSAA is an organization in the middle of major financial reform a few examples:

2008/09:
$\$ 300-\$ 1,100$ member fee based on size
$\$ 517,000$ collected in fines
32 sports paid either share of gate or participation fee for State Series

Today:
$\$ 25$ Membership fee
$\$ 135,500$ collected in fines
8 team sports share a percent of gate for State Series

## 6 Yr Record

In 2014-15-FHSAA will redirect S1.2 million more PER YEAR to schools compared to 2008
\$400,000-Membership Dues Reduced to nominal \$25
$\$ 168,000$ - More being paid to Finals Teams ( $\$ 417,000 /$ year)
\$371,000-Less in Fines
\$16,000 - Less in FB Classic Fees \& elimination of
Recognized Sport Participation fees
\$65,000 - Less in Tournament Sanction Fees
\$43,000 FHSAA Share of State Series Reduced - now only collect $15 \%$ on 7 sports and $25 \%$ football

Questions of Eligibility

## Eligibility Status

- FHSAA reviewed less than $1 \%$ of student athletes eligibility.
- Schools determined eligibility for $99 \%$ of eligibility questions.
- The FHSAA determined eligibility for 247 students.

## Eligibility Requests

SY: 2014-2015

- FHSAA determined 196 eligible; 51 ineligible.
- 247 eligibility requests received from schools.
- $21 \%$ determined ineligible had the opportunity to appeal.
- Eligibility determinations are made within 10 business days.

## Bylaw and Policies

SY: 2014-2015

- $56 \%$ of eligibility requests
- Limit of Eligibility
- Age
- Grades
- $28 \%$ of eligibility requests included GPA, grades, impermissible benefits, attendance for consecutive semesters and middle school repeating grades.
- $16 \%$ are based on other questions of eligibility.


## Eligibility Determination



## Appeal Request

SY: 2014-2015

- $72 \%$ of appeals requested, were determined by Schools/School Districts.
- FHSAA determined $28 \%$ at schools request.
- Schools and School Districts may have stricter rules.
- Schools and School Districts make determinations independent of the FHSAA.

## Sectional Appeals Committee Members



- 7 committee members are comprised of member schools representatives and the community:
- 3 members
- Selected by their peers from public (2) and private (1) schools.
- 1 private school member
- Selected by Florida Association of Academic Nonpublic Schools (FAANS).
- 1 member
- Selected by the Florida School Board or Florida Superintendent Association.
- 2 members are appointed by the FHSAA Board of Directors
- For diversity and as an attorney.
- Ocala
- Bradenton
- Ft. Lauderdale


## Eligibility Timeline

- Eligibility requests submitted July-May
- Step One:
- School can determine student eligibility.
- Upon school request, FHSAA determines student eligibility within 10 business days.
- Step Two:
- Sectional appeals offered every month in the schools geographical area.
- Step Three and Four (optional):
- Mediation (within 10 days of sectional appeals)
- Board of Directors (meets quarterly)


## Eligibility Results Timeline

Number of Days for a Sectional Appeal Hearing


15 days or less 16-30 days 31-45 days 46-60 days $\mathbf{*}$. 61 days or more

## Eligibility Ruling Timeline

- The average number of days for an appeal is 28 .
- Schools can choose to submit an appeal at any point during the school year.
- Some schools chose to submit an appeal dependent upon the sport.

Myths and Truths

## Myths \& Truths

- Transfers
- Myth: If a student transfers during the school year, he/she is ineligible.
- Truths:
- Students eligibility is determined by the school upon transferring.
- If desired, the school can request assistance from the FHSAA.
- Students can retain eligibility after transferring.
- Myth: If a student changes schools during the summer, the student is ineligible.
- Truth: Students can change schools during summer without impacting eligibility.


## Myths \& Truths

- School Choice
- Myth: FHSAA bylaws does not support school choice.
- Truths:
- FHSAA bylaws and policies do not restrict school choice.
- A student is eligible wherever the student starts the first day of school.
- The FHSAA supports the school or school districts determination of eligibility.
- Appeal Process
- Myth: The people determining student eligibility, are the same people serving on the appeals committee.
- Truths:
- Superintendents, School Board members, Principals, Athletic Directors, attorneys and community members serve on appeals committees.
- FHSAA staff do not serve on the appeals committees.
- Schools which determine students eligibility do not serve on appeals committees.
