Education update

- With **Governor Rick Scott's leadership**, the **State Board of Education** and the **Florida Legislature**, Florida is on a path to continued success
- These improvements are a testament to Florida's **hard-working teachers, principals and administrators** who help our students achieve success, as well as **Governor Rick Scott's commitment** to ensure all Floridians have access to a **quality education**



Closing the Achievement Gap

What does NAEP tell us?

- Florida narrowed the poverty gap at both grades 4 and 8 in reading and mathematics by 2.7 and 5.5 points respectively between 2003 and 2013.
- In 2013, Florida was the only state in the nation to narrow the achievement gap between White and African American students at both grades 4 and 8 in both reading and mathematics.
- A recent report by the U.S. Chamber of Commerce rates Florida “A” for academic achievement for low income/minority students, ranking us 10th in the nation.



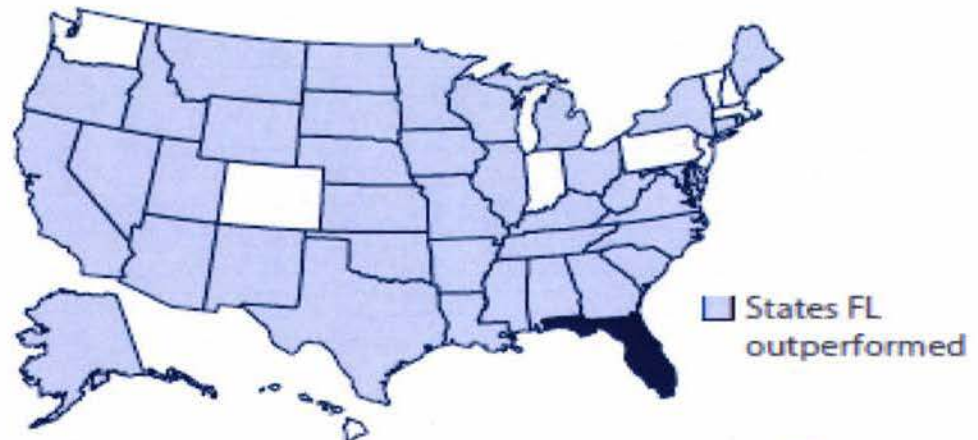
A Decade of Data on State Academic Achievement

In the American Legislative Exchange Council's (ALEC) *Report Card on American Education, October 2014*, Florida is the second highest ranked state. Additionally, over the past decade Florida was one of 20 states in the nation that made **statistically significant progress in 4th and 8th grade reading and 4th and 8th grade mathematics** as measured on NAEP.

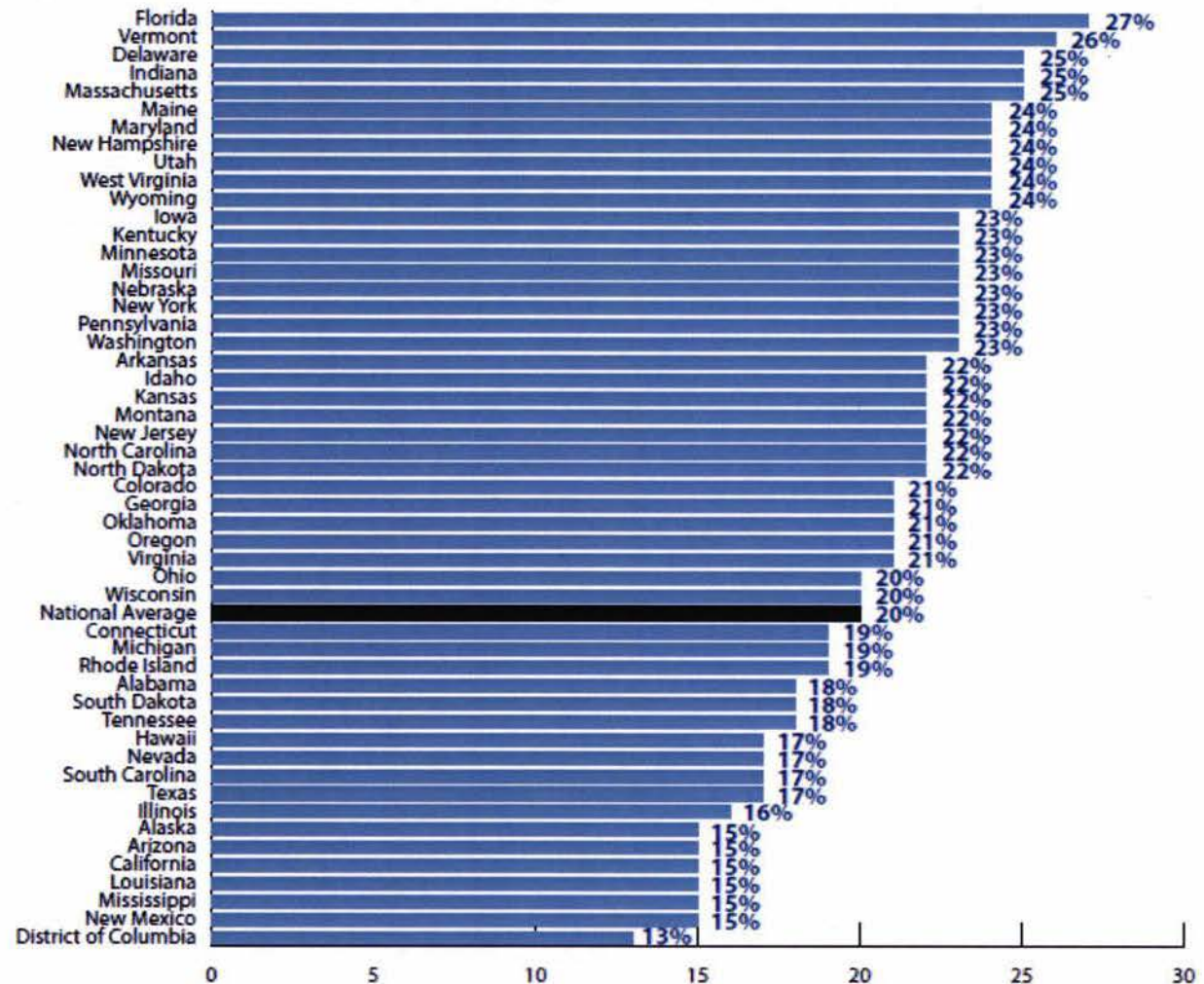

A Decade of Data on State Academic Achievement

In the same ALEC report, Florida had the largest percent of free and reduced-price lunch eligible students scoring “proficient” or better on the NAEP fourth-grade reading exam in 2013. Florida also was one of only six states that made statistically significant progress in eighth-grade reading and mathematics between 2011 and 2013.

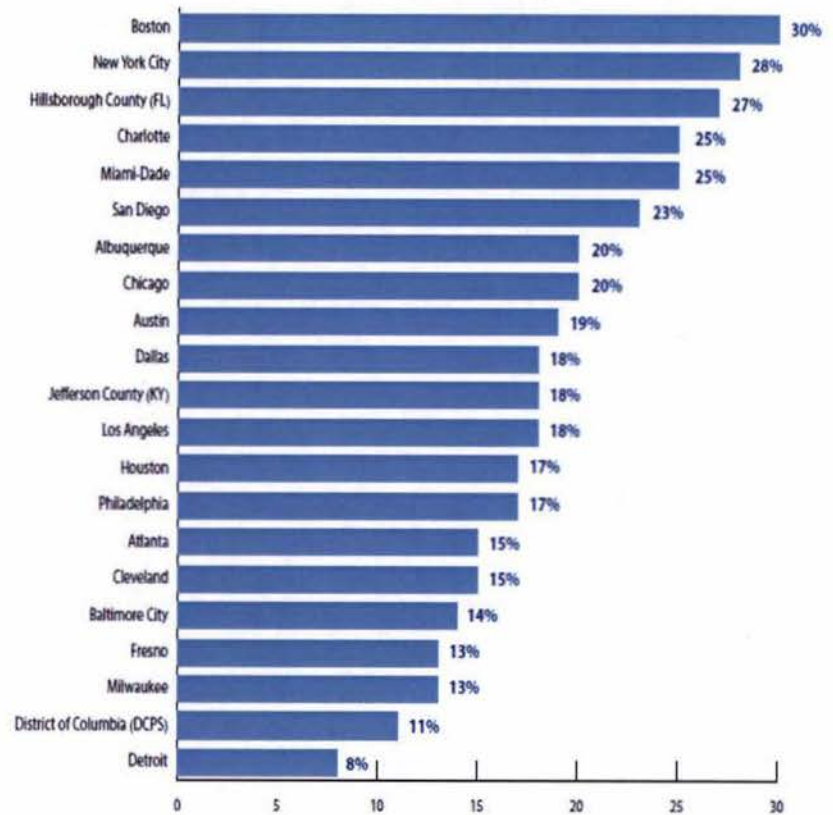
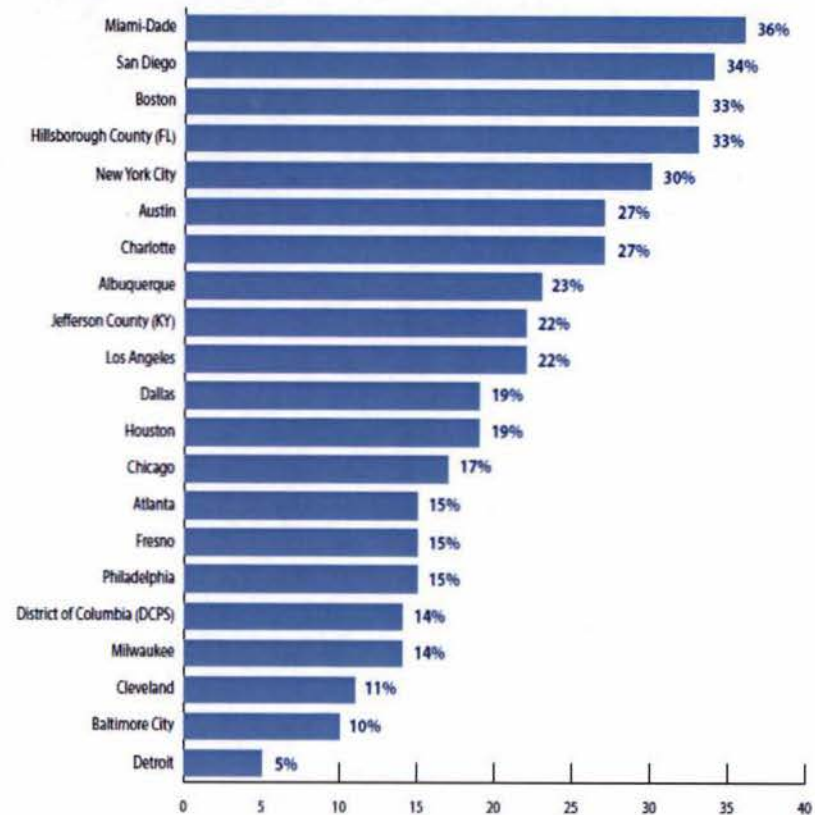

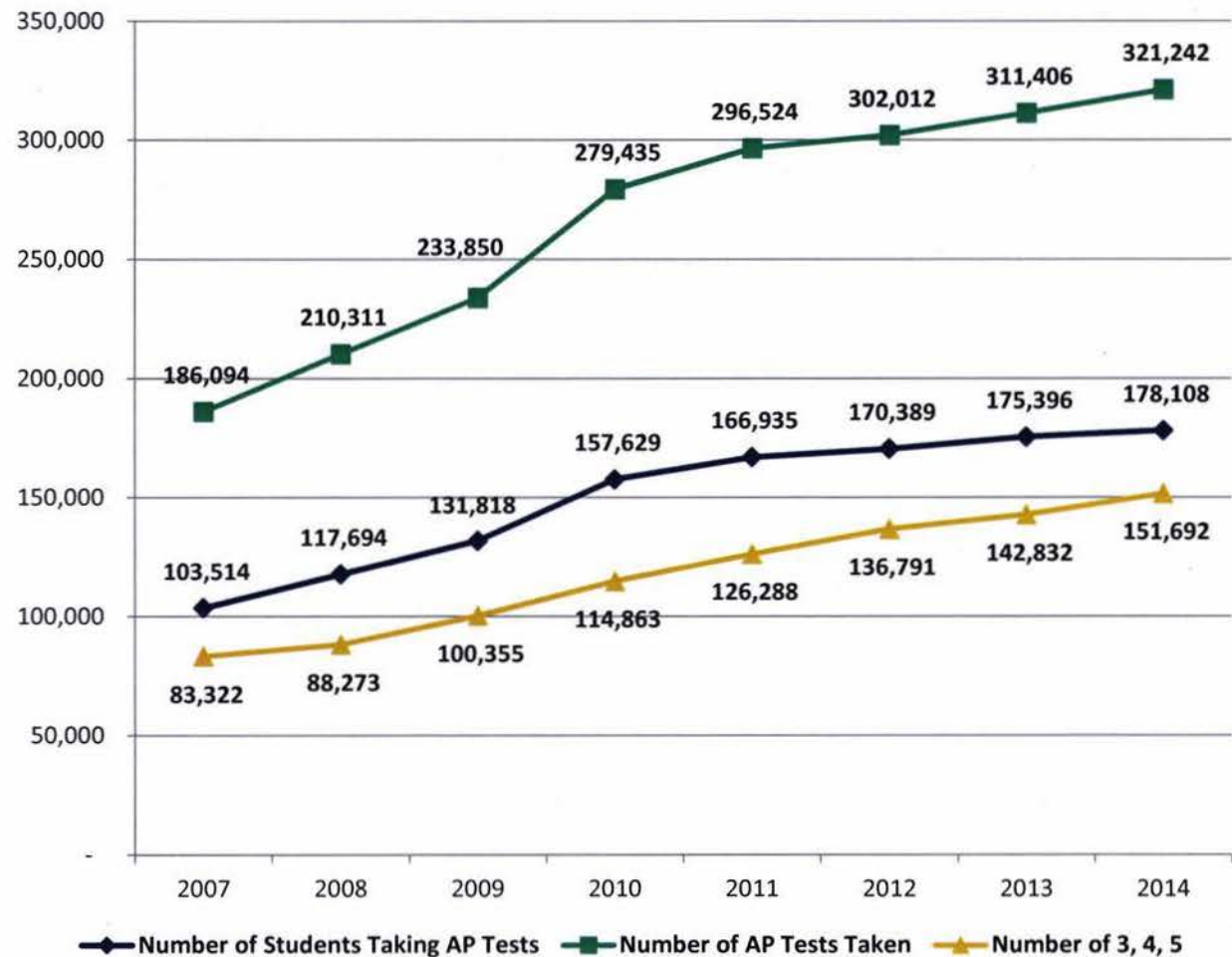
FIGURE 3 | LOW-INCOME GENERAL EDUCATION STUDENTS SCORING "PROFICIENT" OR BETTER ON THE TRIAL URBAN DISTRICT NAEP FOURTH-GRADE READING, 2013

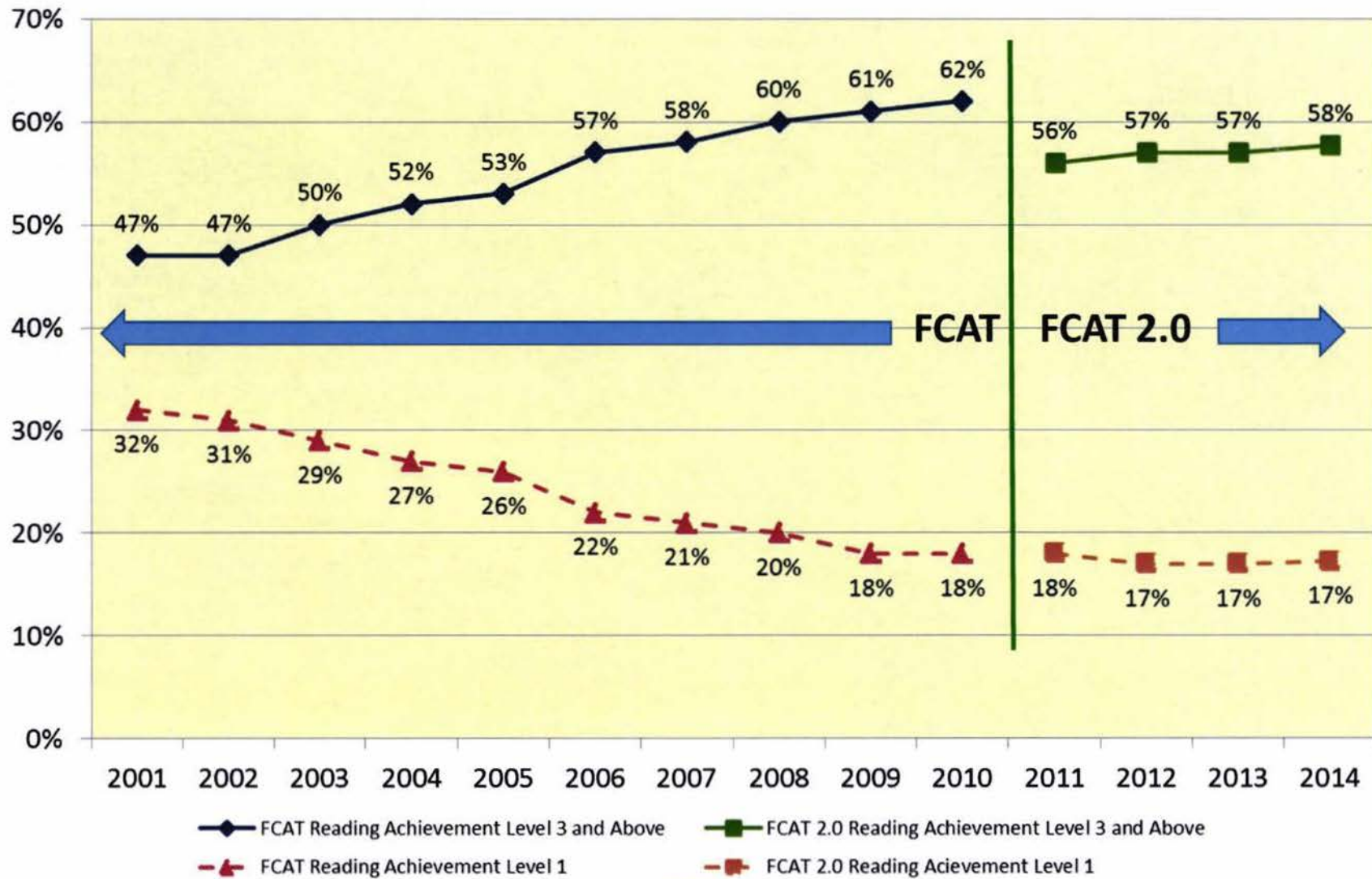


Florida AP Test Taking and Passing Increased

- In 2014, Black (11.3%) and Hispanic (8.7%) students saw large percentage increases in scores at level 3 or higher

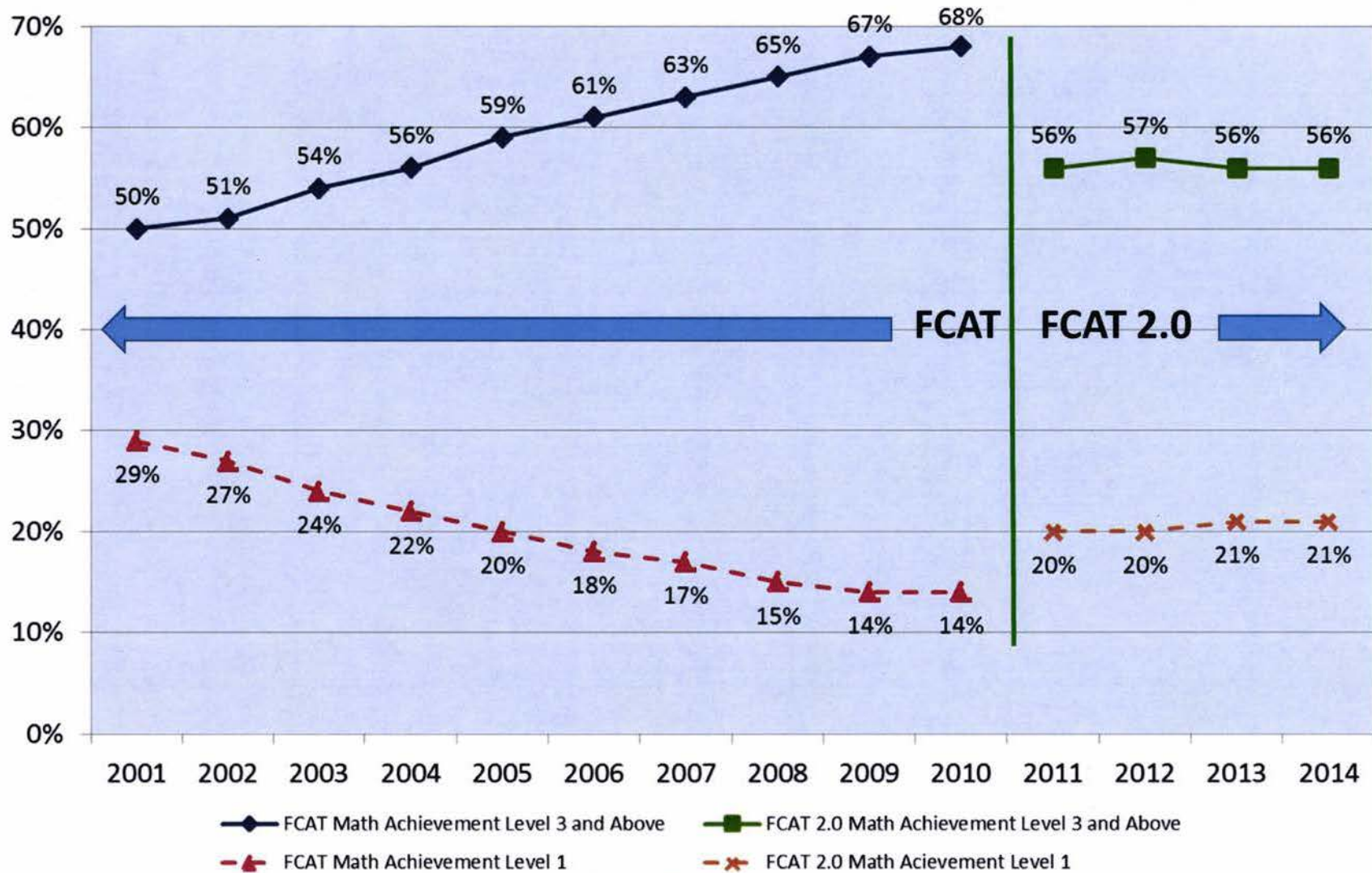


Student Reading Performance Increased



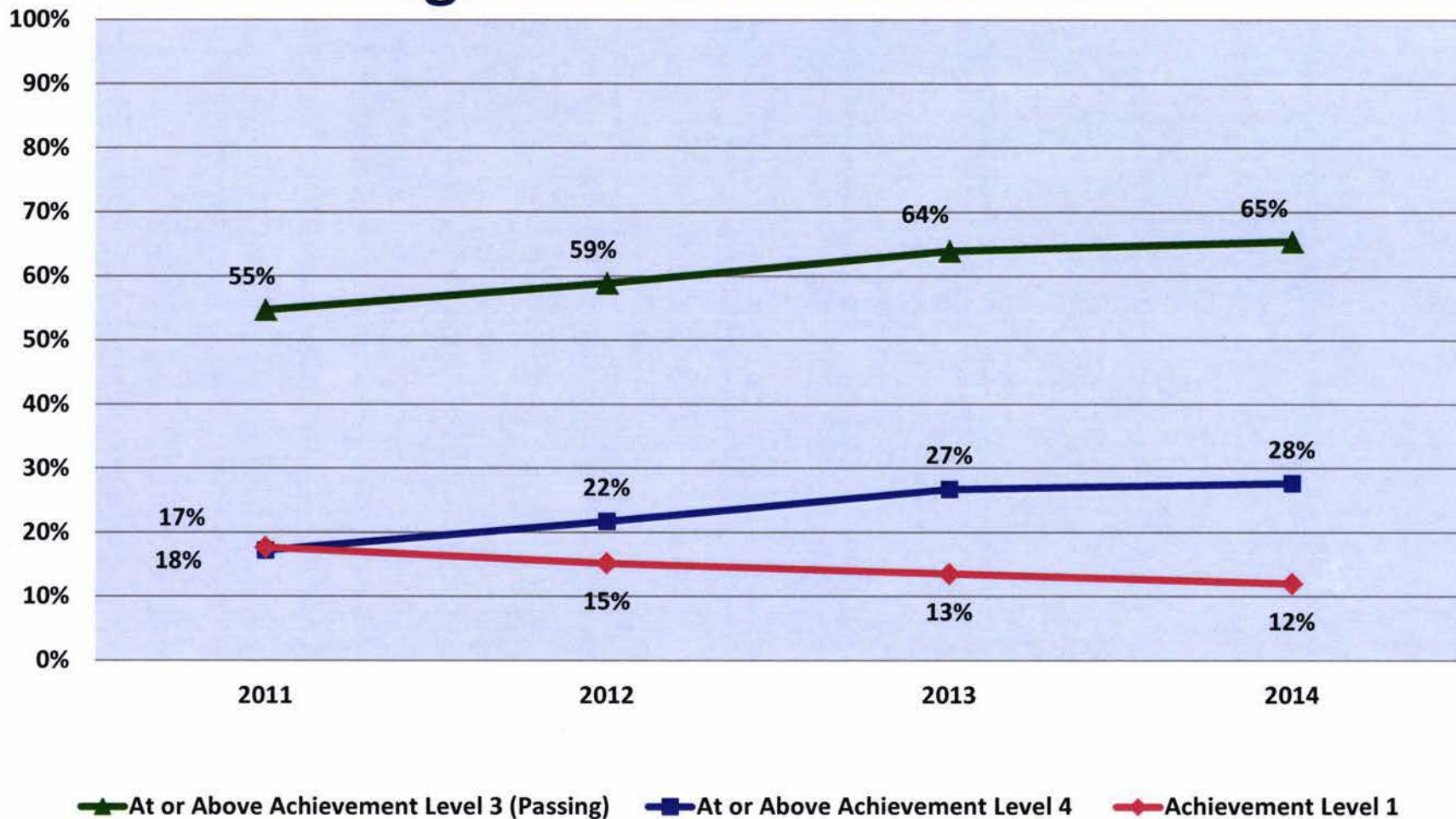
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Student Math Performance Increased

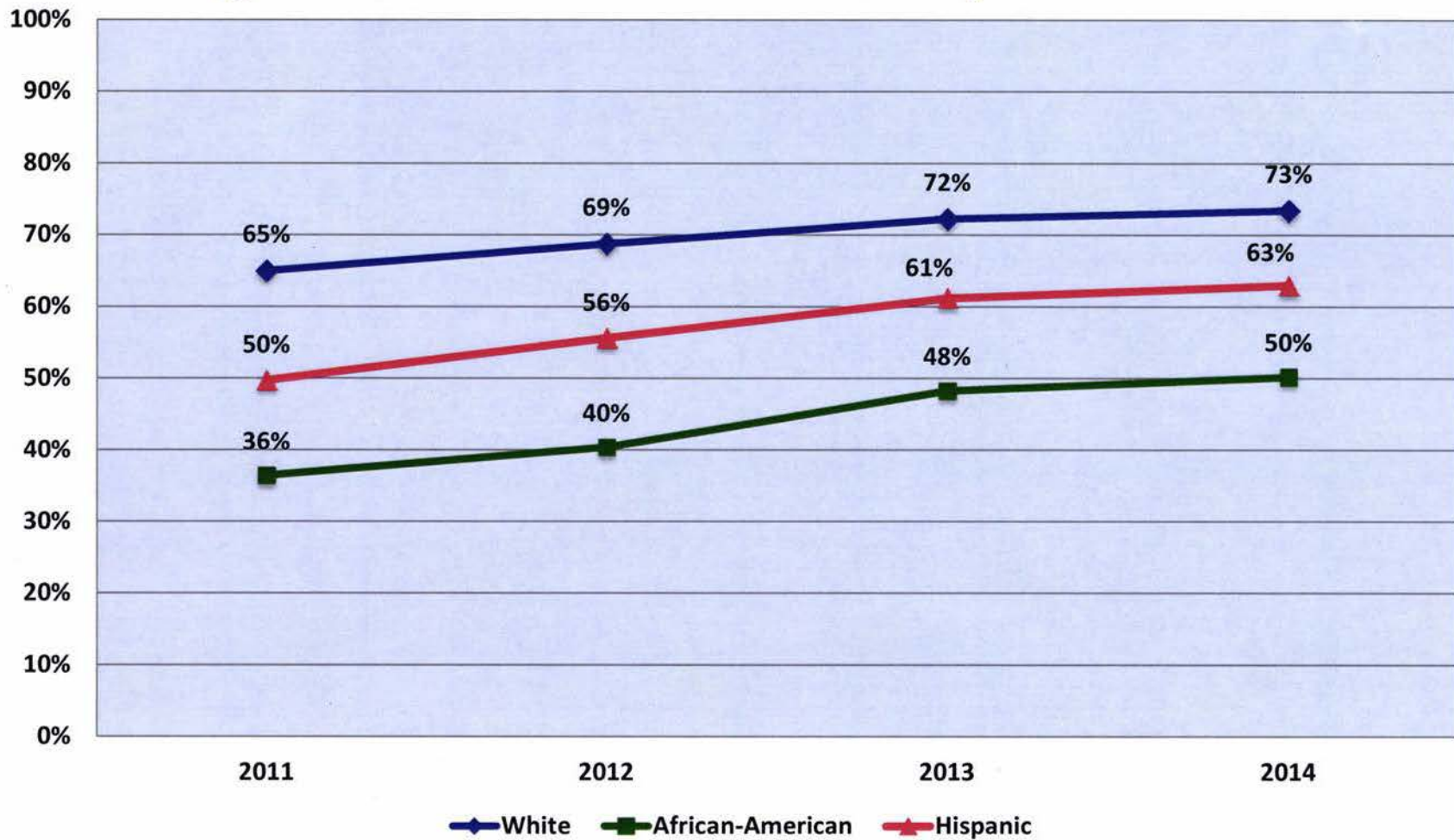


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Percentage of Students Passing Algebra 1 EOC Increased



Algebra 1 Achievement Gap Narrowed



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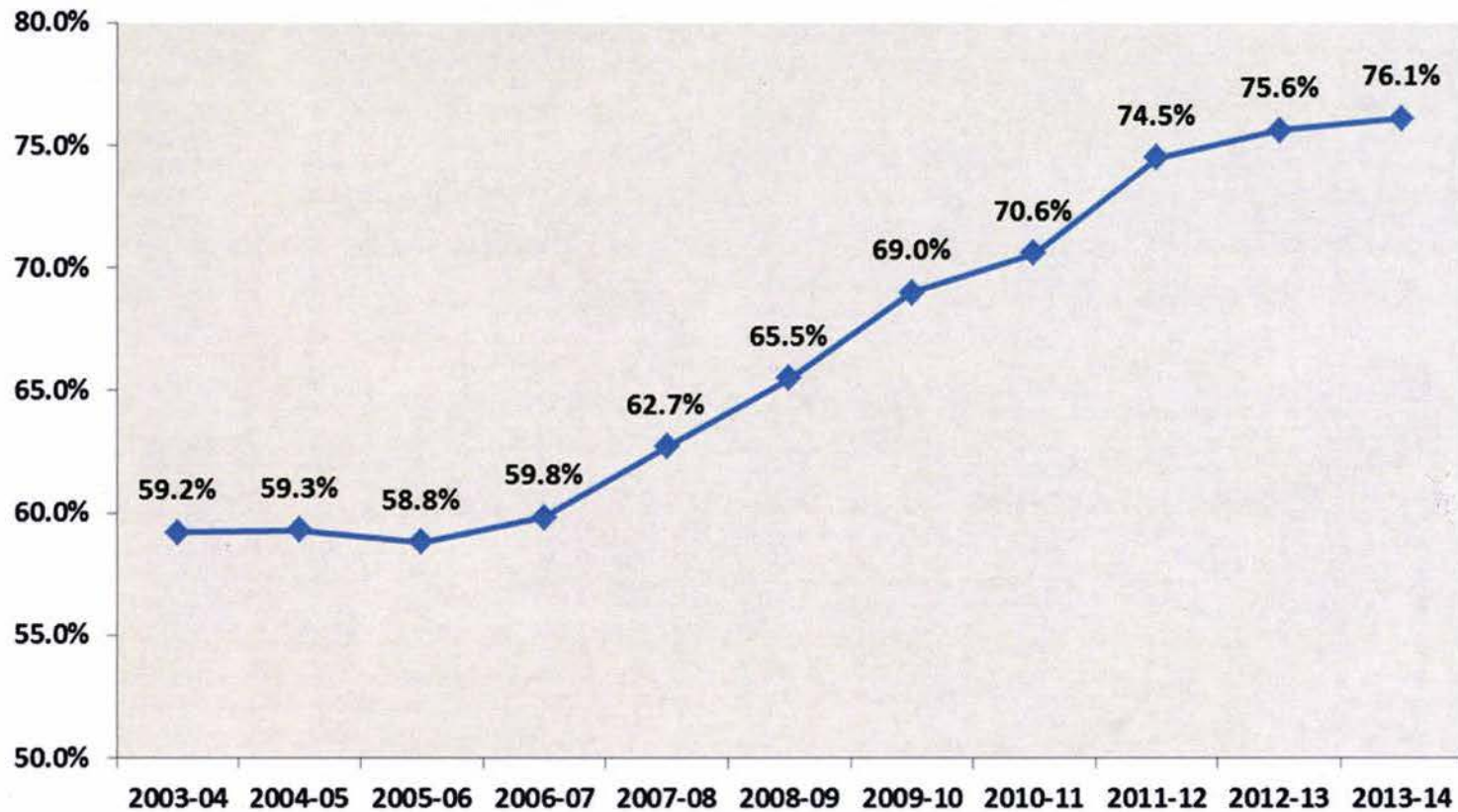

Florida's Graduation Rate is the Highest Ever!

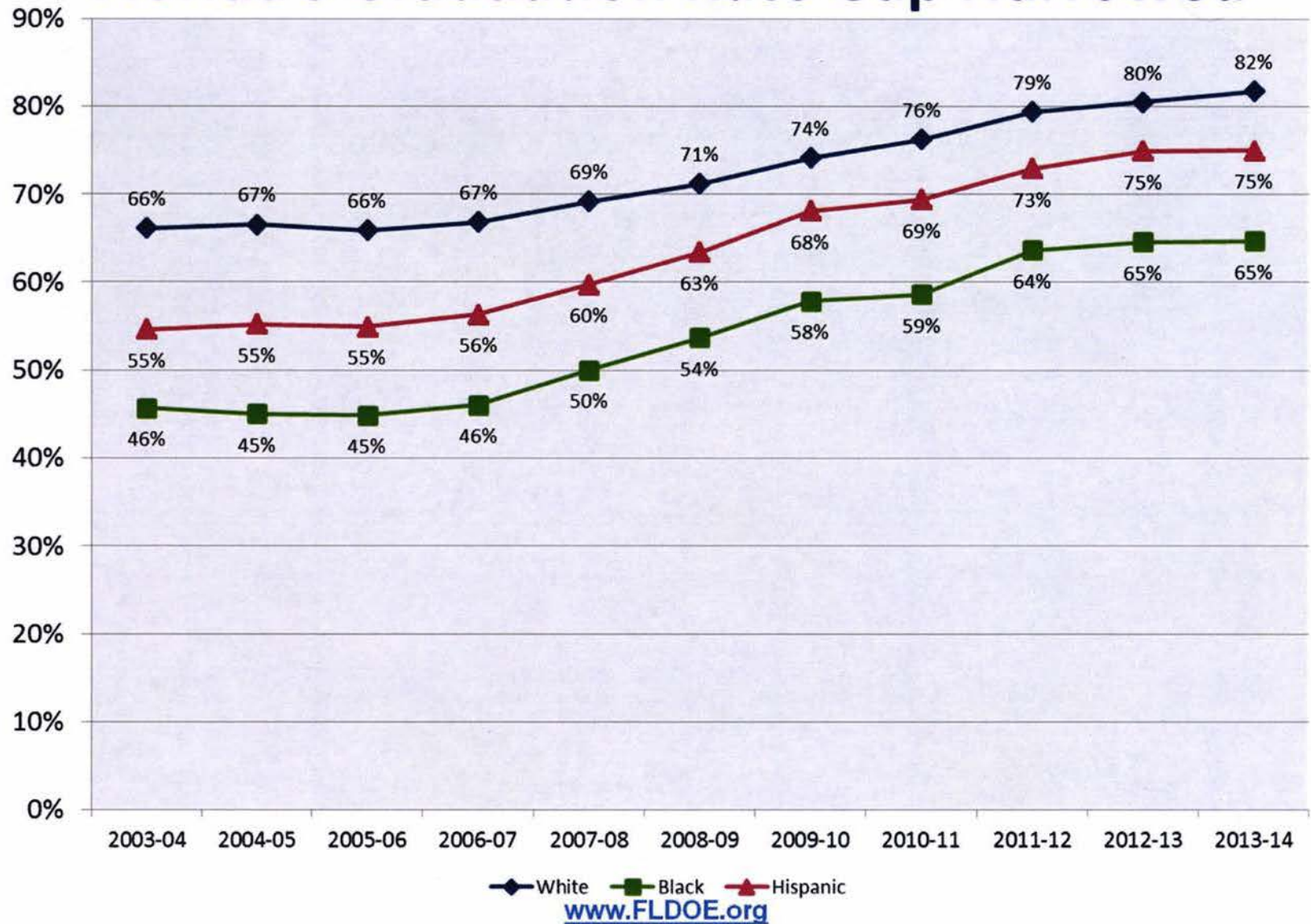
Florida's Graduation Rates, 2003-04 through 2013-14

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ESEA Waiver

ESEA Waiver- English Language Learners

- USDOE granted Governor Scott and Commissioner Stewart's request regarding the use of English language learners' assessment results in the accountability system.
- English language learners' assessment results will not be included in the school grades achievement components until they have been in school in the U.S. for two years.
- English language learners will continue to be tested and all assessment results will continue to be included in the learning gains components of the school grades calculation.

ESEA Flexibility Waiver Renewal

- Florida's current ESEA Flexibility Waiver is applicable through the end of the 2014-15 school year
- In order to renew the waiver request Florida must submit an application by March 31, 2015
- If Florida receives a renewal of its waiver request it will be valid through the end of the 2017-18 school year
- In order to receive a renewal Florida will need to update its ESEA Waiver application, seek stakeholder input, and make assurances to the USDOE regarding actions it will take through 2017-18



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Next Steps

Keep Florida Learning Committee

- The Committee will review further deregulation opportunities for school districts; review instructional material review processes used by school boards; identify strategies to increase parental involvement; and review the implementation of the Florida Standards and the Florida Standards Assessment.
- Comprised of 11 members, including the Commissioner of Education, legislators, teachers, superintendents, school board members, higher education representatives, and members of the public

- Interested Floridians have until **January 31, 2015**, to submit their applications.

Assessment Investigation

The Commissioner is conducting an investigation of all standardized assessments used in school districts, to include:

- What student decisions are based on test results (such as promotion, course grade, progress monitoring; includes additional district uses of statewide standardized tests)
- Reasons students are required to take each assessment
- Grade levels or groups of students that take each assessment
- Whether test information is provided to teachers and/or students
- How much time is given for each assessment
- Test frequency and format (computer based or paper)

Assessment Investigation Timeline

- Provided template to districts December 19
- Districts will return survey by late January
- Department will summarize results
- Commissioner's final report will be provided before the beginning of 2015 legislative session

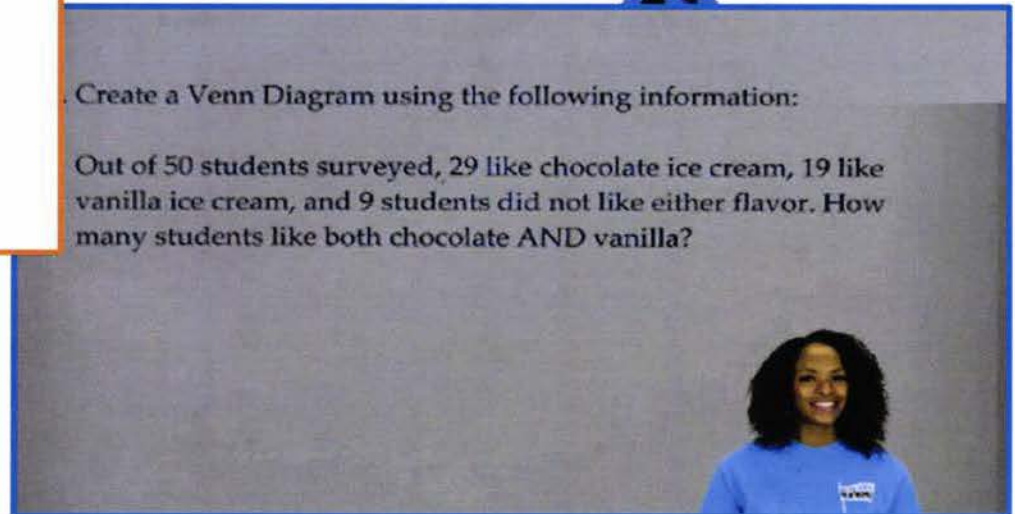

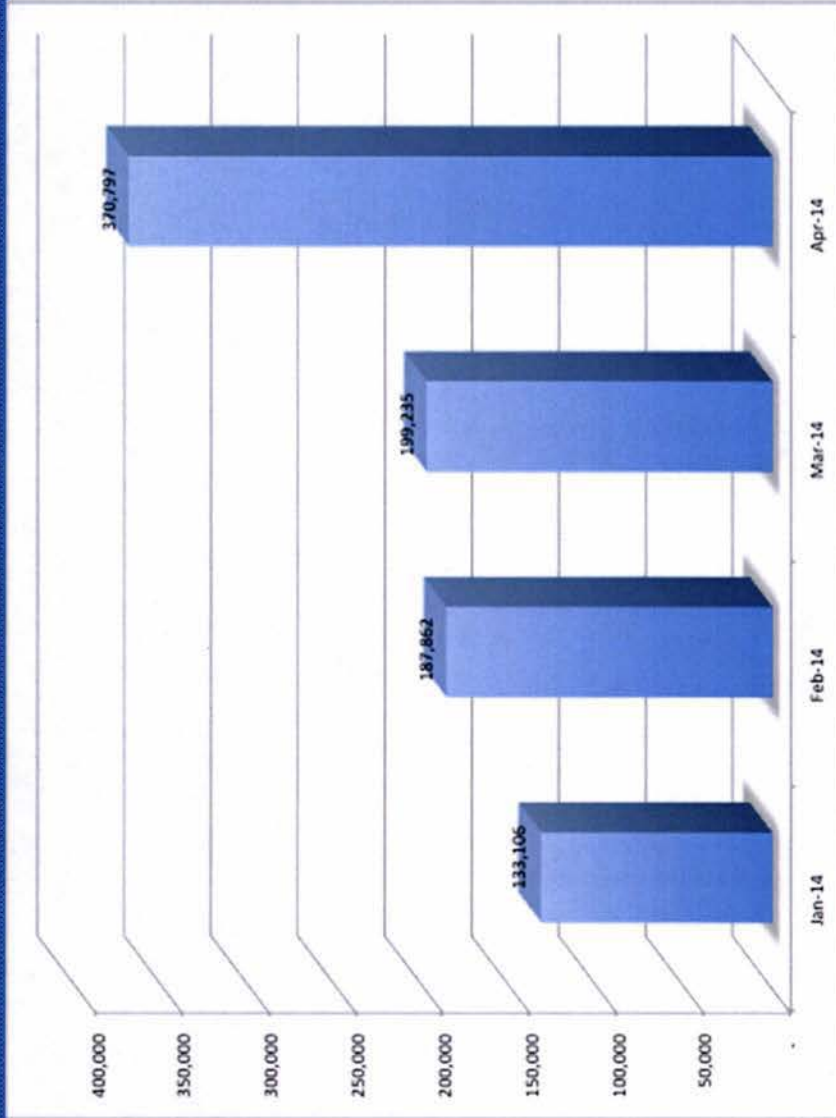
Number of Teachers Who Accessed Algebra Nation: Oct 2013 - Oct 2014



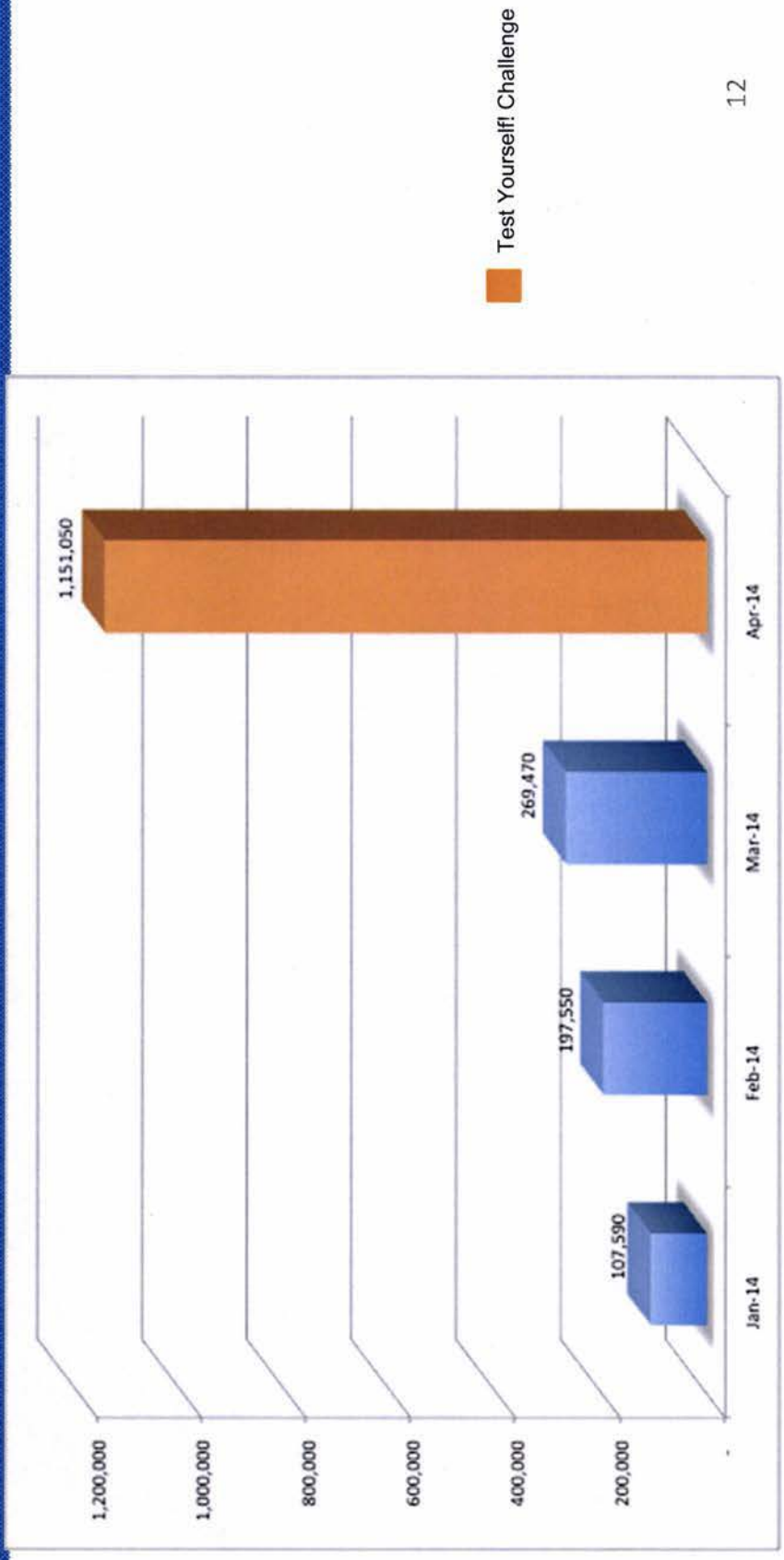

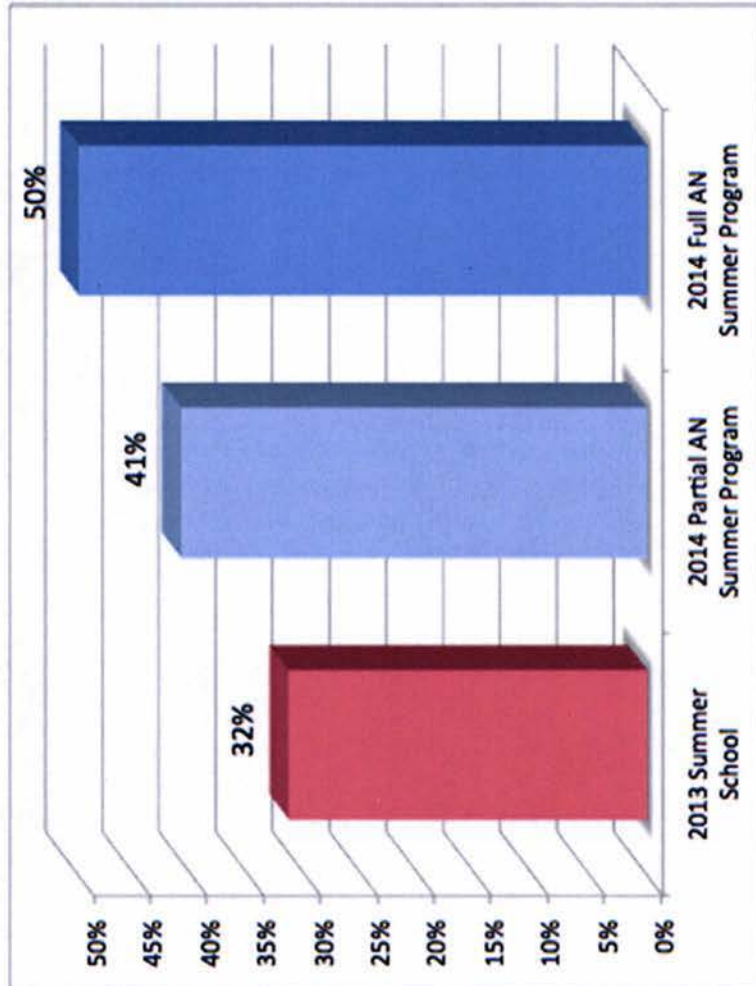

Florida noted that 64 % of its inmates test below 9th grade level; using traditional approaches to education, 90 % do not complete a high school program*

The SHCOE program employs a performance-based, self-paced, teacher-supported instructional model to address the needs of this population.

 Below 9th Grade Level TABE

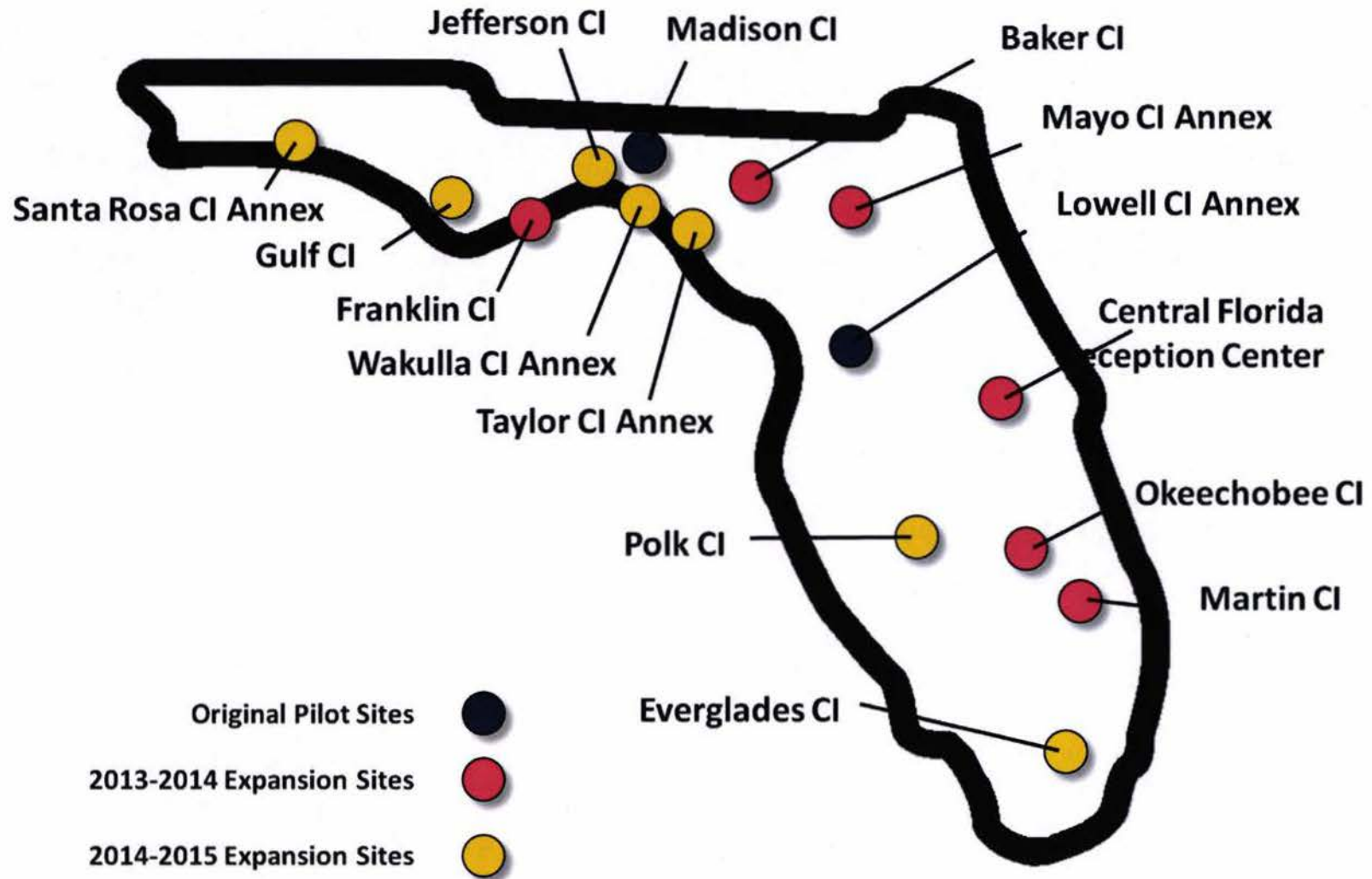

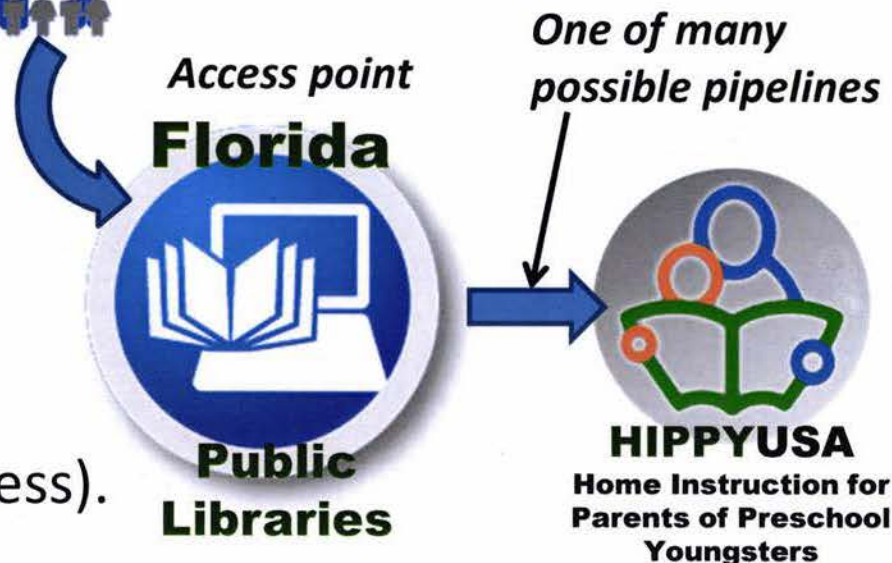

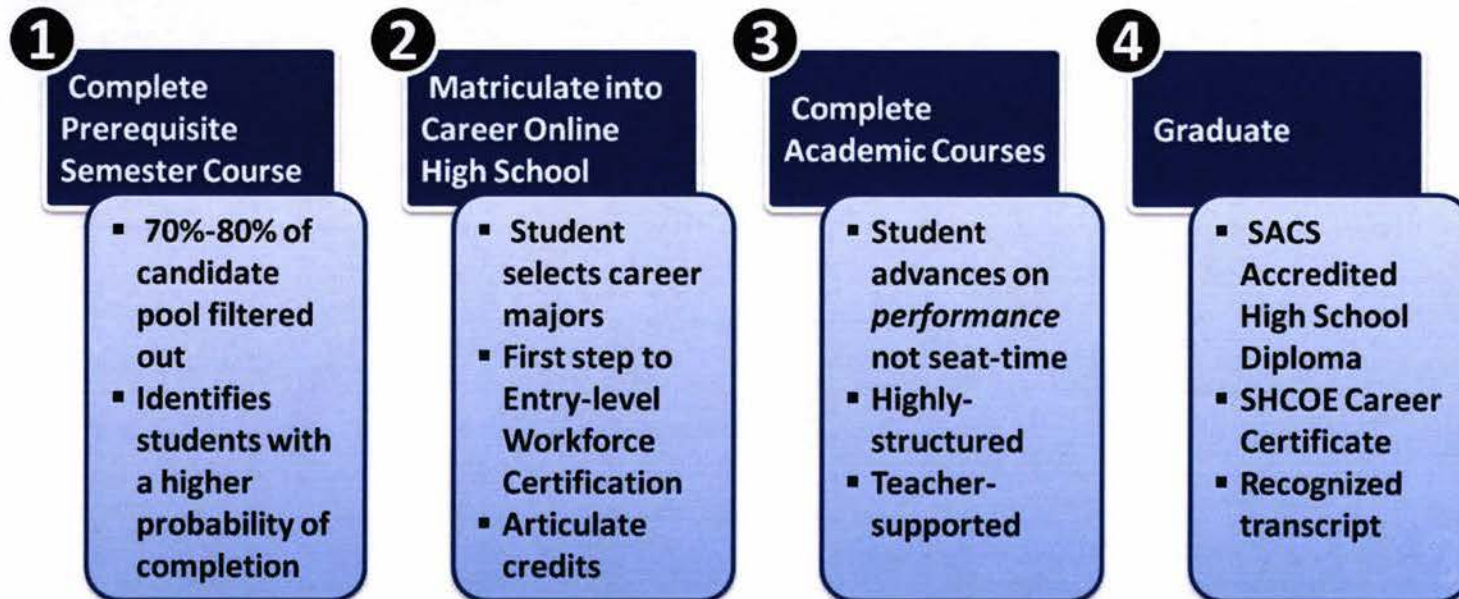

Leveraging the Florida Public Library System to Address the Needs of Florida's Adult Dropouts

The Dropout Population Impacts Florida's Economic Potential

- Florida has approximately 1,181,401 adults that lack a high school diploma (6% of the population).
- Increasing the status of dropouts to high school graduates or the equivalent would result in \$768.8 million in annual state sales taxes¹.
- The typical lifetime cost of each high school dropout to taxpayers is approximately \$292,000².
- Approximately 60% of Florida's prison inmates, and nationally 50% of persons on death row, are high school dropouts^{3,4}.
- This population often lacks home access to online technology that would allow participation in online educational programs (e.g., computers, Internet access, etc.).

Public Libraries can Provide a Cost Effective High School Completion Program

Smart Horizons Career Online Education (SHCOE), Florida-based, AdvancED/SACS accredited online school district, will partner with public libraries across Florida to offer a career-based, adult high school diploma program designed to prepare adults for transition into the workplace. As depicted in Figure 1 (below), the program will employ a prerequisite screening model to enroll only those students with a high probability of success. SHCOE sponsors several such programs across the US.



Figure 1. The prerequisite screening model supports effective use of online education resources. This same model is currently in use in public library systems across the nation.

SHCOE's Performance Record (Nationally)

- 6,314 students served.
- 70% student retention rate.
- 76% of graduates enroll in postsecondary vocational programs.
- Average age 27 years.
