# Florida Construction Industry Licensing Board & Florida Building Commission

## Careers & Competition Subcommittee

### Florida Construction Industry Licensing Board

- Composed of 18 members who are appointed by the Governor.
- The Construction Industry Licensing Board (CILB) consists of two divisions:
  - Division I: General Contractors, Building Contractors, Residential Contractors, Building Official, Consumer Member
  - Division II: Sheet Metal, Pool, Plumbing, Air Conditioning, Mechanical, Underground Utility, Roofing, Building Official, Consumer Member
- Quorum is five members in each Division.
- Meets for three days every month across the state.
- The CILB's responsibilities include:
  - Adopt administrative rules
  - Issue licenses
  - Approve continuing education courses
  - Conduct probable cause hearings and issue final orders of discipline
  - Issue declaratory statements

### **Administrative Rules**

- CILB rules are found in Chapter 61G4-F.A.C.
- Rulemaking is done in accordance with the Administrative Procedures Act.
- Recent rule changes include:
  - Revising definitions to implement HB 1021 (2017)
  - Revising and clarifying examination and continuing education requirements

### **Construction Licensing Standards**

- There are over 70,000 contractors currently licensed by the CILB.
- Under Section 489.115, F.S., applicants must provide fingerprints and undergo criminal background checks.
- Section 489.111, F.S., allows the CILB to deny any applicant for failure to demonstrate good moral character.
- Lack of good moral character includes crimes involving: theft, violence, and fraud.
- Examples of denials based on criminal histories include: murder, burglary, aggravated assault, and battery.
- During Fiscal Year 2016-2017:
  - There were 4,824 applications submitted.
  - 140 applications were denied, three of which were for criminal backgrounds.

### **Homeowners Recovery Fund**

- The Homeowners Recovery Fund is administered by the CILB and is funded through building permit fees.
- Homeowners injured by Florida licensed contractors may file claims with the Fund
  after the entry of a disciplinary order from the CILB or after obtaining unsatisfied civil
  judgment against the contractor.
- The final order or civil judgment must be for financial mismanagement which includes failure to satisfy liens or abandoning a construction project.
- Payment from the fund is capped at \$50,000 for Div.1 contractors and \$15,000 for Div.2 contractors. Each contractor has an aggregate lifetime cap of \$500,000 for Div.1 contractors and \$150,000 for Div. 2.
- In Fiscal Year 2016-2017:
  - There were 11 claims denied and 54 claims paid.
  - The total payouts were \$1,333,577.

### **ULA Enforcement after Hurricane Irma**

To combat unlicensed activity (ULA) after Hurricane Irma, the Department will:

- Conduct enforcement operations with local police and building departments. One operation has already been conducted since Irma. More operations will follow after construction increases.
- Go door-to-door to construction sites and verify licenses.
- Prosecute unlicensed contractors and seek administrative fines of up to \$10,000 (83 cases have been opened since Irma).
- ULA is a felony during this state of emergency, so we'll also refer cases for criminal prosecution.
- The elderly are often victims of ULA scams, so we'll conduct group outreaches focusing on these vulnerable Floridians.
- Conduct a radio advertising campaign and post billboards in affected areas
- Conduct sweeps of neighborhoods in hard hit areas (64 conducted since Irma):
  - Canvas neighborhoods to warn homeowners about the dangers of ULA.
  - Post signs warning that ULA is a felony during a state of emergency.

### Florida Building Commission

Composed of 27 members who are appointed by the Governor:

Architects	Engineers	Contractors
Fire Protection	Building Officials	Product Manufacturers
Insurance Industry Representatives	Public Education Representatives	Green Building Representatives

- Meets every six weeks across the state.
- Quorum is a majority of members (14).
- The Florida Building Commission's responsibilities include:
  - Adopt and update the Florida Building Code
  - Issue interpretations of the Code through declaratory statements
  - Approve training courses
  - Approve construction products for statewide use

### **Technical Advisory Committees**

- There are 11 Technical Advisory Committees (TAC) for each substantive area of the Code.
  - Electrical, Mechanical, Code Administration, Special Occupancy, Swimming Pool, Energy, Plumbing, Accessibility, Fire, Structural, and Roofing.
  - Made up of 10-12 members appointed by the chairman of the Commission.
  - No more than 1/3 of the members can be from the same interest category. The Committees are primarily made up of building officials/inspectors, commission members, industry representatives, contractors, and other users of the Code.
  - Review code amendments, declaratory statements, research projects, and other items of interest in order to provide a recommendation to the Commission for action.

### **Amendments to the Code**

- Glitch amendment process
  - Used to address Code conflicts with Federal and State laws.
    - Typically, there is only one glitch amendment between triennial code cycles.
- Annual technical amendments
  - Amendments are limited to health, safety and welfare issues that strengthen the Code. The Commission may incorporate interpretations of the Code found in its own opinions, final orders, and declaratory statements.

### **Local Amendments to the Code**

- Must be more stringent than the requirements of the Code.
- Local jurisdictions submit their locally approved amendments to the Commission.
   The locally approved amendments are published on the Florida Building Code Information System and are viewable by the public.
- Local amendments, except those related to water conservation practices, do not carry forward when a new edition of the Code goes into effect. Therefore, local jurisdictions must readopt local amendments after each new edition of the Code goes into effect.

### History of the Florida Building Code

- Prior to 1992 More than 400 local governments were responsible for building codes.
- 1992 Hurricane Andrew revealed the deficiencies of the State's existing building codes.
- 1998 The Florida Building Code Commission was created.
- 2002 The 1<sup>st</sup> Edition of the Florida Building Code went into effect, which created one unified code.
- 2017 The 6<sup>th</sup> Edition of the Florida Building Code will go into effect on December 31, 2017.

## Prior Process of Adopting the Code

- Updated triennially
- New editions of the model codes are used as the base of the Code. Technical committees review proposed changes and recommend changes to the Commission.
- The Commission approves a draft of the Code.
- The draft Code goes through several periods of public review and comment.
- The Commission approves a final draft of the Code.
- The formal rulemaking process is initiated to adopt the new edition of the Code.

### Recent Changes to the Adoption Process

- The passage of HB 1021 (2017) changed the process for developing the Code.
  - Under the new process, the Commission has discretion to incorporate "model codes." Before HB 1021, incorporation of the model codes was mandatory.
  - The first Code that will be developed using the new process will be the 7<sup>th</sup> Edition of the Florida Building Code in 2020.
- Will the recent changes weaken the Code?
  - No, development of future editions of the Code will still go through a rigorous development process. Health and safety will remain the top priority.
  - Florida law prohibits the weakening wind mitigation and water intrusion standards.
     In addition, the Commission must adopt standards required by the Federal
     Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), the Department of Housing & Urban
     Development (HUD), and the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP).

#### SUMMARY ANALYSIS

The Florida Building Commission (Commission) located under the Department of Business and Professional Regulation (DBPR) implements and adopts the Florida Building Code (Code). The Code includes all of the statewide building requirements and standards for construction in the state. The Commission is made up of 27 members who are appointed by the Governor and confirmed by the Senate.

#### The bill:

- Reduces the number of members on the Commission from 27 to 11.
- Amends the qualifications for the architect and electrical contractor members of the Commission.

The bill is not expected to have a fiscal impact on state or local government.

The bill provides an effective date of July 1, 2018.

#### **FULL ANALYSIS**

#### I. SUBSTANTIVE ANALYSIS

#### A. EFFECT OF PROPOSED CHANGES:

#### **Present Situation**

The Florida Building Code

In 1974, Florida adopted legislation requiring all local governments to adopt and enforce a minimum building code that would ensure that Florida's minimum standards were met. Local governments could choose from four separate model codes. The state's role was limited to adopting all or relevant parts of new editions of the four model codes. Local governments could amend and enforce their local codes, as they desired.1

In 1992, Hurricane Andrew demonstrated that Florida's system of local codes did not work. Hurricane Andrew easily destroyed those structures that were allegedly built according to the strongest code. After the state filled the property insurer void left by failed and fleeing private insurance companies, and the federal government poured billions of dollars of aid into disaster areas, the Governor appointed a study commission to review the system of local codes and make recommendations for modernizing the system. The 1998 Legislature adopted the study commission's recommendations for a single state building code and enhancing the oversight role of the state over local code enforcement. The 2000 Legislature authorized implementation of the Florida Building Code (Code), and that first edition replaced all local codes on March 1, 2002.2

In 2004, for the second edition of the Code, the state adopted the International Code Council's I-Codes. The International Code Council (ICC) is an association that develops model codes and standards used in the design, building, and compliance process to "construct safe, sustainable, affordable and resilient structures." Every three years the ICC publishes the I-Codes: a complete set of model comprehensive, coordinated building safety and fire prevention codes, for all aspects of construction, that have been developed by ICC members. All 50 states adopted the I-Codes.<sup>3</sup>

All subsequent Florida Building Codes have been adopted utilizing the I-Codes as the base code. The most recent Code is the 5th edition, which is referred to as the 2014 Florida Building Code. The 5th edition of the Code went into effect June 30, 2015.4 In 2017, the Legislature enacted legislation requiring the Florida Building Commission (Commission) to review the I-Codes every three years to determine if the Code needs to be updated, instead of requiring automatic adoption of the latest code.<sup>5</sup>

The Commission also reviews the National Electric Code (NEC) every three years to determine if the Code needs to be updated. The NEC is published every three years by the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) and has been adopted by all 50 states. The NFPA develops codes to address the installation of electrical conductors, equipment, and raceways; signaling and communications

conductors, equipment, and raceways; and optical fiber cables and raceways in commercial, residential, and industrial occupancies in order to protect people and property from electrical hazards.<sup>6</sup>

#### The Florida Building Commission

The Commission was statutorily created to implement the Code. The Commission, which is housed within the Department of Business and Professional Regulation (DBPR), is a 27-member technical body responsible for the development, maintenance, and interpretation of the Code. The Commission also approves products for statewide acceptance. Members are appointed by the Governor and confirmed by the Senate and include design professionals, contractors, and government experts in the various disciplines covered by the Code. Members, who must be certified to do business in the state and must be actively engaged in the designated profession, include the following:

- · One architect:
- One structural engineer;
- One air-conditioning or mechanical contractor;
- One electrical contractor;
- One member from fire protection engineering or technology;
- One general contractor;
- · One plumbing contractor;
- · One roofing or sheet metal contractor;
- One residential contractor;
- Three members who are municipal or district code enforcement officials, one of whom is also a
  fire marshall;
- One member who represents the Department of Financial Services;
- One member who is a county code enforcement official;
- One member of a Florida-based organization of persons with disabilities or a nationally chartered organization of persons with disabilities with chapters in the state;
- One member of the manufactured buildings industry;
- One mechanical or electrical engineer;
- One member who is a representative of a municipality or a charter county;
- One member of the building products manufacturing industry:
- One member who is a representative of the commercial building owners and managers industry;
- One member who is a representative of the insurance industry;
- One member who is a representative of public education;
- One member who is a swimming pool contractor;
- One member who is a representative of the green building industry and who is a third-party commission agent, a Florida board member of the United States Green Building Council or Green Building Initiative, a professional who is accredited under the International Green Construction Code (IGCC), or a professional who is accredited under Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design (LEED);
- One member who is a representative of a natural gas distribution system;
- One member who is a representative of the Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services' Office of Energy; and
- One member who is the chair.

The Commission has 11 Technical Advisory Committees (TAC) ranging from the building structural TAC to the swimming pool TAC.<sup>8</sup> TACs are made up of Commission members and other parties who advise the

Commission on declaratory statements, proposed amendments, and any other areas of interest of the Commission.<sup>9</sup>

The Commission is currently in the process of adopting the 6th Edition of the Florida Building Code, which is tentatively expected to go into effect on December 31, 2017.<sup>10</sup>

#### **Effect of the Bill**

The bill reduces the number of members on the Commission from 27 to 11. The bill removes members representing the following:

- Air-conditioning or mechanical contractors;
- Two of the municipal or district code enforcement officials, including a fire marshall;
- The Department of Financial Services;
- · County code enforcement officials;
- The representative for persons with disabilities;
- · Manufactured buildings industry;
- Mechanical or electrical engineers;
- Municipal or charter counties;
- Building products manufacturing industry;
- · Commercial building owners and managers industry;
- Public education;
- The green building industry;
- The natural gas distribution system; and
- The Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services' Office of Energy.

#### The bill amends:

- The qualifications of the architect member from an architect who is "registered and actively
  practicing in the state" to an architect who is "licensed in the state and has at least 5 years of
  experience in the design and construction of buildings containing Group R occupancy(ies) at or
  above 210 feet above the lowest level of emergency service access." A Group R Occupancy is any
  building containing sleeping units either for permanent dwellings or transient occupancy;<sup>11</sup> and
- The qualifications for the electrical contractor member from an electrical contractor to an electrical contractor "or an electrical engineer."

The bill also appears to remove the requirement for a member to be appointed the Chair of the Commission.

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A bill to be entitled

An act relating to the Florida Building Commission; amending s. 553.74, F.S.; revising the membership of the Florida Building Commission; revising membership qualifications; providing an effective date.

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Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Florida:

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Section 1. Subsection (1) of section 553.74, Florida Statutes, is amended to read:

553.74 Florida Building Commission.-

- (1) The Florida Building Commission is created and located within the Department of Business and Professional Regulation for administrative purposes. Members are appointed by the Governor subject to confirmation by the Senate. The commission is composed of  $\underline{11}$   $\underline{27}$  members, consisting of the following:
- (a) One architect <u>licensed pursuant to chapter 481 with at least 5 years of experience in the design and construction of buildings containing Florida Building Code designated Group R occupancy at or above 210 feet in height above the elevation of the lowest level of emergency services access registered to practice in this state and actively engaged in the profession.

  The American Institute of Architects, Florida Section, is encouraged to recommend a list of candidates for consideration.</u>
  - (b) One structural engineer registered to practice in this

state and actively engaged in the profession. The Florida Engineering Society is encouraged to recommend a list of candidates for consideration.

(c) One air-conditioning or mechanical contractor certified to do business in this state and actively engaged in the profession. The Florida Air Conditioning Contractors

Association, the Florida Refrigeration and Air Conditioning Contractors Association, and the Mechanical Contractors

Association of Florida are encouraged to recommend a list of candidates for consideration.

(c)(d) One electrical contractor or electrical engineer certified to do business in this state and actively engaged in the profession. The Florida Association of Electrical Contractors and the National Electrical Contractors Association, Florida Chapter, are encouraged to recommend a list of candidates for consideration.

(d) (e) One member from fire protection engineering or technology who is actively engaged in the profession. The Florida Chapter of the Society of Fire Protection Engineers and the Florida Fire Marshals and Inspectors Association are encouraged to recommend a list of candidates for consideration.

(e)(f) One general contractor certified to do business in this state and actively engaged in the profession. The Associated Builders and Contractors of Florida, the Florida Associated General Contractors Council, and the Union

Contractors Association are encouraged to recommend a list of candidates for consideration.

- (f)(g) One plumbing contractor licensed to do business in this state and actively engaged in the profession. The Florida Association of Plumbing, Heating, and Cooling Contractors is encouraged to recommend a list of candidates for consideration.
- (g)(h) One roofing or sheet metal contractor certified to do business in this state and actively engaged in the profession. The Florida Roofing, Sheet Metal, and Air Conditioning Contractors Association and the Sheet Metal and Air Conditioning Contractors' National Association are encouraged to recommend a list of candidates for consideration.
- (h)(i) One residential contractor licensed to do business in this state and actively engaged in the profession. The Florida Home Builders Association is encouraged to recommend a list of candidates for consideration.
- (i) (j) One member Three members who is are a municipal or district code codes enforcement official officials, one of whom is also a fire official. The Building Officials Association of Florida and the Florida Fire Marshals and Inspectors Association are encouraged to recommend a list of candidates for consideration.
- (k) One member who represents the Department of Financial Services.
  - (1) One member who is a county codes enforcement official.

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The Building Officials Association of Florida is encouraged to recommend a list of candidates for consideration.

- (m) One member of a Florida-based organization of persons with disabilities or a nationally chartered organization of persons with disabilities with chapters in this state.
- (n) One member of the manufactured buildings industry who is licensed to do business in this state and is actively engaged in the industry. The Florida Manufactured Housing Association is encouraged to recommend a list of candidates for consideration.
- (o) One mechanical or electrical engineer registered to practice in this state and actively engaged in the profession.

  The Florida Engineering Society is encouraged to recommend a list of candidates for consideration.
- (p) One member who is a representative of a municipality or a charter county. The Florida League of Cities and the Florida Association of Counties are encouraged to recommend a list of candidates for consideration.
- (q) One member of the building products manufacturing industry who is authorized to do business in this state and is actively engaged in the industry. The Florida Building Material Association, the Florida Concrete and Products Association, and the Fenestration Manufacturers Association are encouraged to recommend a list of candidates for consideration.
- (r) One member who is a representative of the building owners and managers industry who is actively engaged in

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commercial building ownership or management. The Building Owners and Managers Association is encouraged to recommend a list of candidates for consideration.

- (j)(s) One member who is a representative of the insurance industry. The Florida Insurance Council is encouraged to recommend a list of candidates for consideration.
- (t) One member who is a representative of public education.

- $\frac{(k)}{(u)}$  One member who is a swimming pool contractor licensed to do business in this state and actively engaged in the profession. The Florida Swimming Pool Association and the United Pool and Spa Association are encouraged to recommend a list of candidates for consideration.



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

#### AMENDMENT SUMMARY October 25, 2017

#### Amendment 1 by Rep. McClain (Strike-all amendment):

- Reduces the number of Florida Building Commissioners from 27 members to 15 members. (The bill reduced membership to 11 from 27.)
- Maintains current law for the qualifications of the architect member.
- Amends the qualifications of the member who is a general contractor from a general contractor to a certified general contractor or a certified building contractor.
- Adds the Florida Home Builders Association to the list of associations who are encouraged to recommend a list of candidates for the contractor member.
- Removes the plumbing contractor member.
- Reduces the number of members who are municipal or district code enforcement officials from three members to two.
- Removes the requirement that a members include municipal or district code enforcement officials. Instead requiring a municipal, county, or district official.
- Maintains current law related to the following members (The bill removed these members):
  - An air-conditioning or mechanical contractor;
  - o A member of the manufactured buildings industry;
  - o A member of the building products manufacturing industry; and
  - A member who represents a natural gas distribution system.
